GENEVA MEET STARTS TODAY

Preparatory Disarmament Committee of League is in Session

GENEVA, Nov. 30.—(UP)—The Preparatory Disarmament Commission of the League of Nations, enlarged and rejuvenated by the last assembly, convened here today for the purpose of launching the League's new 1928 disarmament program.

Hugh Wilson, U. S. Ambassador to Switzerland, represented the United States on the commission, which now is composed of 28 of the leading nations of the world, including Soviet Russia. The commission convened under the presidency of Jonkheer J. London, Dutch minister to Paris, who has been one of the leading exponents of disarmament ever since the League's organization.

The immediate task of the commission will be the final linking up with the problem of disarmament the question of security, which the September assembly decided constitutes the only basis on which disarmament ever can be attained.

Under instructions both from the League assembly and the League council, the commission will proceed to the creation of a parallel commission that will prepare agenda regarding security for the eventual disarmament conference that the League hopes to summon.

This commission will be composed of expert jurists representing all of the nations now on the Preparatory Disarmament Commission that are members of the League of Nations, or, in other words, all of the members with the exception of the United States.

curity Commission for the reason that the American delegates have repeatedly stated in the past that the United States cannot participate in security pacts, and regional agreements on which the League hopes to attain a basis of security that will permit of reductions in armaments. Should, however, the United States express a desire to be on the Preparatory Security Commission as well a place will be created for her.

As soon as the Preparatory Disarmament Commission has arranged for the creation of the above commission it is expected to adjourn until next spring in order to let the security commission set its work under way. Then the two commissions working hand in hand hope to be able to present to the League Assembly in September, 1928, the complete agenda for a first international disarmament and security conference.

At the spring meeting of the Preparatory Disarmament Commission the latter will proceed to a second reading of the draft disarmament convention which it drew up last spring.

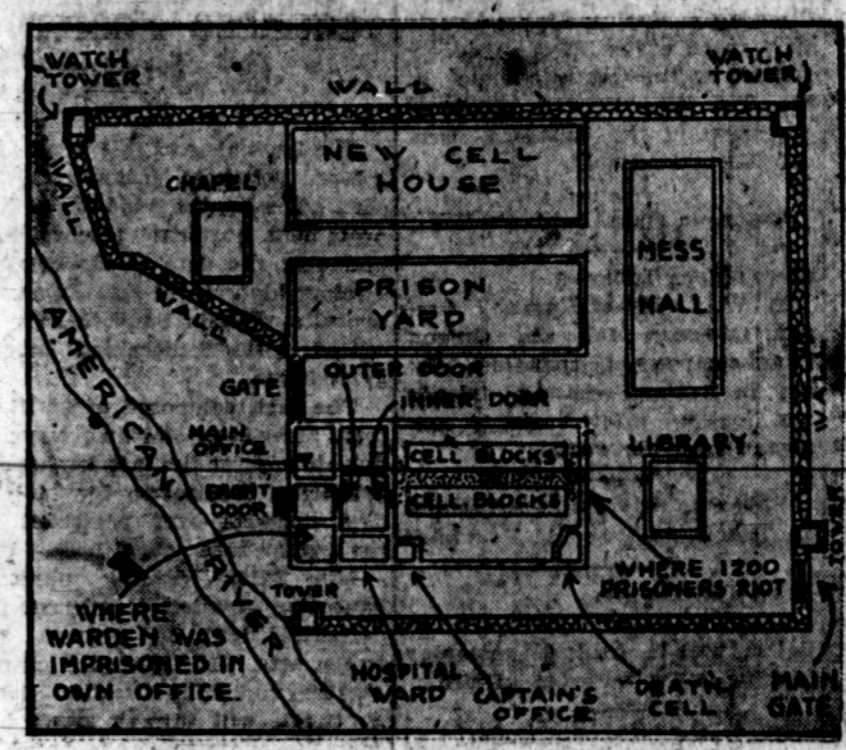
In the meantime the Security Commission will work out a project for security based on the increase of as many regional security mutual assistance and arbitration pacts as possible and secondly on perfecting machinery of the League so that each League member may know to what extent it can count on League help in the case of aggression.

One of the latter points to be decided is to find out from each League member just how much of its military, naval and aerial armaments it could contribute to any common effort for the carrying out of League action against any aggressor state.

When the security commission has completed its project it will be co-ordinated with the draft disarmament project of the preparatory commission and the whole will be submitted to the League assembly for final decision relative to the date of convoking the disarmament conference. This will hardly be held before the spring of 1929, according to Leagueers.

SPEED MAD AUTOISTS MADE TO HAUL COAL

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 30.—(UP)—Kansas City has found an outlet for motorists who have a mania for speed and husbands who beat their wives. Out at the municipal farm, James J. O'Rourke, the superintendent, has established a cap line where speeder and wife beaters who are sentenced to the workhouse go to the railroad yards a half a mile away and haul coal back to the farm in wheelbarrows.

Can the Fried Chicken

Since the nice, tender "tries" are growing quickly into tough old hens and roasters something must be done. Prepare the chicken just as you would for table use. Cut it into pieces and roll in flour. After the pieces have been seared to a golden brown on all sides, pack them in jars and process them just as you would any other meat product. The method will depend upon the equipment which you have. Your family will be delighted this winter when you open a jar of fried chicken.

DO YOU KNOW

That eight out of every ten fires could be prevented by promptly correcting hazardous conditions, such as rubbish and accumulation of old paper and litter; faulty electric wiring—often installed by the home owner and the novice? That of all places in the home or factory the furnace or boiler room should be absolutely free from accumulations of combustible refuse—the acme of order and cleanliness? That steam or hot air should be used for heating factories, stores and warehouses—stoves are dangerous? That a match, cigarette butt or cigar ashes should never be thrown in a waste paper basket?

HOME HINTS

Flavor For Whipped Cream—Instead of using sugar to sweeten whipped cream sometimes use a maple syrup. This gives the cream a delicious flavor and is a change.

To Heat Plates—To heat dinner plates safely, hold them under the hot water faucet for a few minutes, then dry at once. The old method of heating in the oven will eventually bring cracks and discoloration.

Reason Why Ungreased Pans Are Used For Angel Food Cake—This is again a matter of friction. When the sides of the cake rise they will stick or cling to the ungreased tin, and thus help to hold up the rest of the cake as it rises. If the pan were greased there would be no sticking, no friction to interfere with the outside of the cake sliding down again and drawing with it the inside.
