BIGGEST HOLIDAY CELEBRATION IN SOUTHERN OREGON

Ford Will Be Awarded as Grand Finale of Week of Celebrating—Miss Popularity Winner Will be Named Saturday Night and Prizes Awarded Monday Night at the Carnival—Free Circus Acts.

The biggest pre-holiday celebration at which the Christmas spirit is expected to predominate, will be staged in Ashland next week in the delayed Lithian carnival to be held December 5 to 10 at the Armory.

A resume of the big carnival and festival plans were given by Clyde Young, High Fizz of the organization today.

The Miss Popularity and baby contest is to end Saturday evening. To the girls in the Miss Popularity contests, six prizes will be awarded—the first a trip to Hawaii or \$300 in cash; two diamond rings, a pearl necklace,

a diamond set wrist watch and a gold compact. Each of the first three babies is to receive a diamond.

The Miss Popularity contestants will be awarded their prizes

Monday night as a feature part of the program while the babies are to be awarded their trophies on Tuesday night of the carnival.

These two contests have advertised the carnival far and wide throughout southern Oregon and northern California.

High acrobatic and trapeze performances, eight acts each evening and a complete change of program each evening is scheduled. The four trapeze artists of the McMahon and Wheeler company, which will present the acts are at present in Victoria, B. C., and will reach here Monday. At 7:30 o'clock in the evening they will present a street act, just before the opening of the doors of the carnival hall.

Concessions will be in charge of Lithians, who will be directed by a professional man in the work. A large amount of exceptionally fine merchandise will be offered in these concessions. Joe Lane, proprietor of the Bohemian Grill here will conduct a soft drink and sandwich concession. There will be dancing each evening with music furnished by the Provost Orchestra.

Clint Baughman is chairman of the decorating committee and will have his staff of workmen busy the latter part of this week getting the armory into gala dress for the big affair.

The Lithian carnival promises to be one of the biggest things in the way of entertainment which has been staged in Ashland for several years.

All tickets sold for the original carnival will be good at this time and all stubs will be placed in the drawing for the new Ford which is to be made Saturday night, climaxing the week of entertainment.

AMBASSADOR SERVES YEAR

Japanese Friendly With 67-Year-Old Diplomat Stationed There

TOKIO, Dec. 1.—(AP)—Charles MacVeagh, United States Ambassador to Japan, celebrates the second anniversary of his arrival in Tokio today.

The Ambassador arrived here Dec. 1, 1925 following the death of Ambassador Edwin Bancroft. Relations between Japan and the United States, which were on a most satisfactory basis when MacVeagh arrived, owing to the untiring efforts of Bancroft, have improved steadily during MacVeagh's regime. Japanese irritation because of adoption of the oriental exclusion clauses in the American immigration laws has lessened noticeably although it would be too much to say it has died out. The holding of a "National Humiliation Day" on the anniversary of adoption of the American exclusion policy has been abandoned, however, and reference to the controversy is less frequent in the Japanese press. MacVeagh has worked hard to improve economic relations be-

tween the United States and Japan and has attained a considerable degree of success despite the fact Japan's buying power has been comparatively weak during the Ambassador's two years here—because of continued financial difficulties and the disruption of Japan's principal export market in China.

The Ambassador is 67 years old and keeps regular office hours in the Embassy quarters in a Tokio office building.

Blue Canaries Are Developed

LONDON.—(AP)—Blue canaries promise to offer the next sensation in bird breeding.

This is the prediction of an expert bird breeder at the eighth London Inter-Club Cage Bird exhibition, where among other freak birds exhibited was a canary said to be the advance-guard of a new race.

The bird is a green canary crossed with a cinnamon and upon which faint blue tints were visible on the back feathers.

Many other rare specimens were seen including "Beauty," a pale buff Yorkshire hen canary which is valued by its owner at \$500.

WILL NAME 1928 HEAD

Order of "O" Banquet Will See Webfoot Captain Named

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Nov. 31.—(Special)—Although a captain for the 1928 Oregon football team will not be selected until the annual Order of the "O" banquet, which as yet has not been dated, Webfoot players and fans have already begun to consider the various eligible and wonder who will receive the honor of piloting the green-clad gridgers through next season's race for Pacific Coast conference honors.

Among those whom campus grid experts feel have a good chance at election are Ira Woodie, quarterback; George Burnell, halfback; Frank Riggs, end; Merrill Hagan, guard; and George Stadelman, center. Woodie, Burnell, Riggs and Hagan will all play their last year under Oregon colors in 1928. All of these players will be seniors except Stadelman, who was a sophomore this year, but who had no difficulty in making the varsity. He was considered by sports writers who saw him in action to equal in ability Beryl Hodgen, the

Webfoot captain, who played beside him at guard. Stadelman was named on several all-conference second eleven.
