## Most Vital Issue Before America Today Is Real Peace Program Says Cadman

The most vital issue before America today, says Dr. E. Parker Cadman, president of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America, is whether there shall be a continuation of war or a perpetuation of peace—whether obtained by international disarmament, the influence of the League of Nations, or a spirit of international democracy obtained by the co-operation of Church and State.

One step toward peace, the League of Nations, Dr. Cadman said in a recent address, "is by itself not only an unattainable but an undesirable, and industrial groups are taught to look upon the League as the bulwark of capitalism and privilege and inimical to the redemption of the toiling masses by their own determination."

"However," he added, "this is propaganda and does not affect the standing of the League with thoughtful people; but it feeds the militancy which should be starved out."

Dr. Cadman said that responsibility for world peace or its alternative rests with Great Britain as upon no other nation. England, he said, had supported the League and had displayed "a conciliatory disposition" toward Germany and her allies in the late war. Until the United States and Great Britain agree beforehand to outlaw war between themselves, admiralty interests are likely to prevail."

Dr. Cadman spoke of nationalism, its power over the people of a country, and its exclusion of "humanism" if carried to extremes. On this point he concluded:

"The point I wish to make is that the infusion of international humanism into provincial patriotism is the sole preventative of national decay and ruin. From this viewpoint, look on the future of the nations, our own included, and ask yourselves if war is anything else than a brutal and senseless appendage to civilization."

"Those who identify both Church and State with the Divine order in the world earnestly demand the outlawry of all war because they believe that these great institutions should cooperate. Their strength is the rationality and justice of their plea that war is needless and therefore a capital offense against that order."

The question of security, Dr. Cadman said, often was overlooked by pacifists. This security, he added, was so important that "could the long suffering nations of continental Europe be assured of their security they would vote to outlaw war tomorrow, since their people of all ranks are not so insane as to cherish violence for its own sake."

Dr. Cadman declared that a call for reduction of armaments by President Coolidge would meet with the "enthusiastic indorsement of the plain people of every civilized land."

It was time, Dr. Cadman said to set up a "Peace Department" at Washington "to take the question of war out of the hands of propagandists and consider it upon its merits." "Meanwhile," he added, "the rabid exhortations to hate and distrust other nations are a pollution of the public mind; a sowing of a deadly seed by those who assert that war is natural, human, inevitable and right."
