#### "AS I KNEW THEM"

Not many men in private life, and fewer in public life, enjoy humor when applied to themselves, but Theodore Roosevelt, Woodrow Wilson and William J. Bryan were exceptions to the rule. In his book published Nov. 15 "As I Knew Them, From Grant to Coolidge," Henry L. Stoddard, former editor of the New York Mail, says that those three men liked to read what the humorists had to say about them, and prized the cartoons in the daily newspapers.

He liked to tell the story of the drunk who, thrown down the stairs of a dance-hall for the third time, picked himself up and said: 'Those fellows can't fool me. They don't want me in there, and they think I don't know it.' He applied the story to his own three defeats for the Presidency."

grows a nurses' corps in the Public Health Service, constitutional amendment for a uniform marriage and divorce law, and various measures tending to relieve American Indians from the injustices and inequalities which now burden them.

The Chamber of Commerce of the United States, representing the business man, advocates substantial reduction of the corporate income tax rate, repeal of excise taxes on particular businesses and of the federal estate tax, "proper" federal food protection, an adequate privately owned and operated merchant marine (along with opposition to continuance of the Shipping Board in the shipping business), reduction of postal rates, railroad consolidation, reorganization of federal administration for efficiency and economy, slight immigration law modification, return of alien property, ratification of the Lusitania treaty with Turkey, parcel post treaty with Cuba, ocean bills of lading, centralization of federal public health activities, a census of distribution, forest conservation and barring of the government from many phases of business which can be profitably conducted by private enterprise.

The American Automobile Association, representing the motorists, will seek renewal of the \$75,000,000 in federal highway aid for 1938 and 1939, repeal of the 3 per cent excise tax on automobiles, and flood relief. Its motor bus division will support a bill to regulate interstate bus traffic.

The American Legion, the largest organization of ex-service-men will support a universal draft act designed to remove profiteering from war and make everybody work of fight, retirement of fit-abled emergency army officers at three-quarters pay, increased appropriations for national defense, a fifteen-million dollar hospital construction program to put all World War veterans now in hospitals in government hospitals.

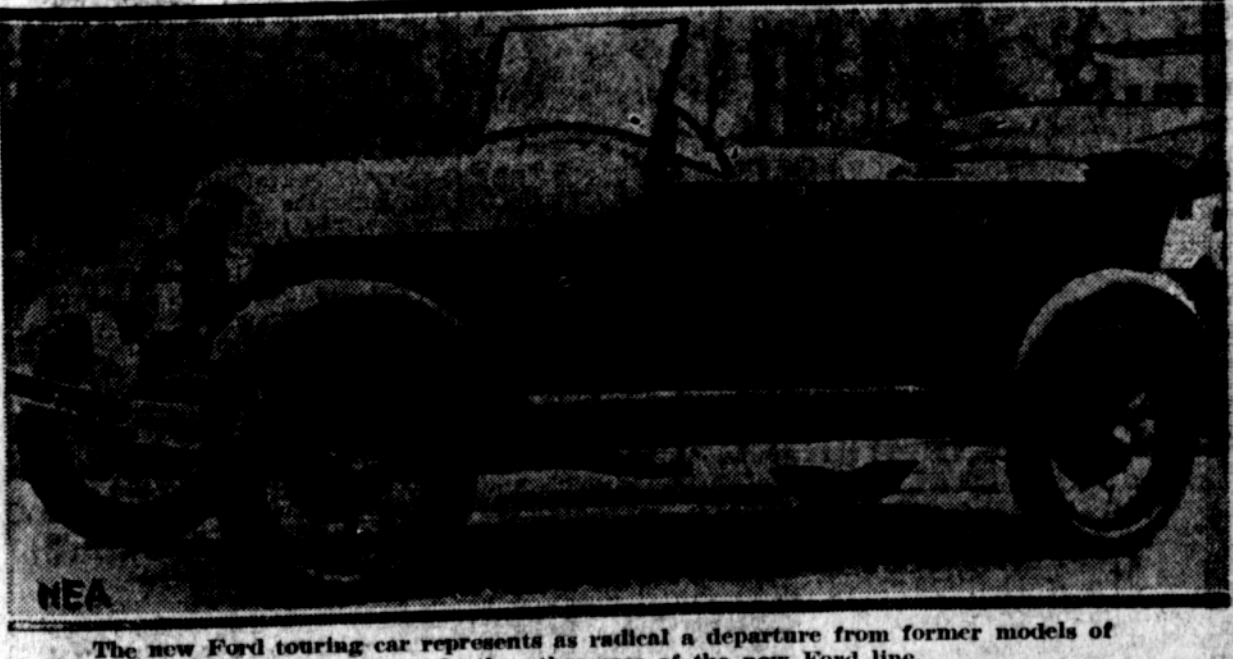
