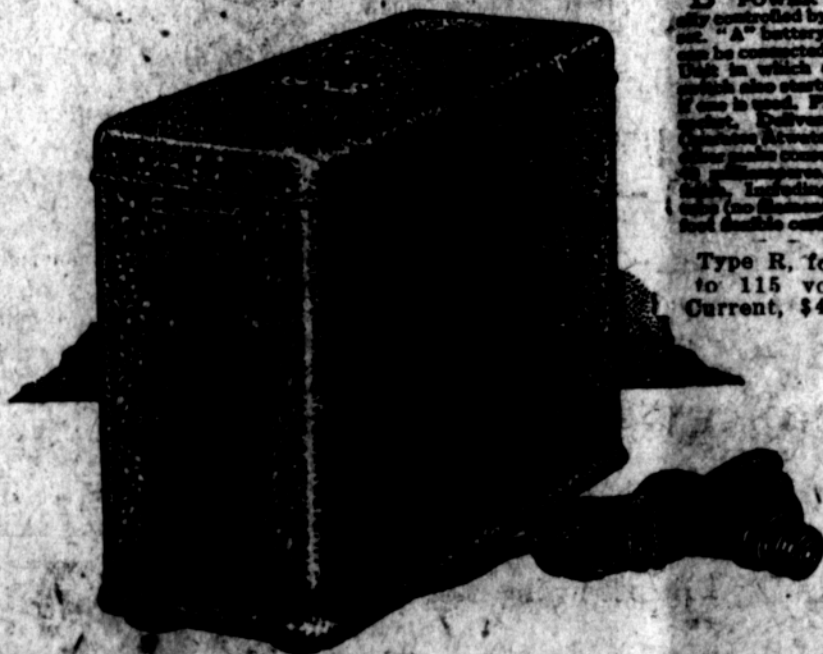

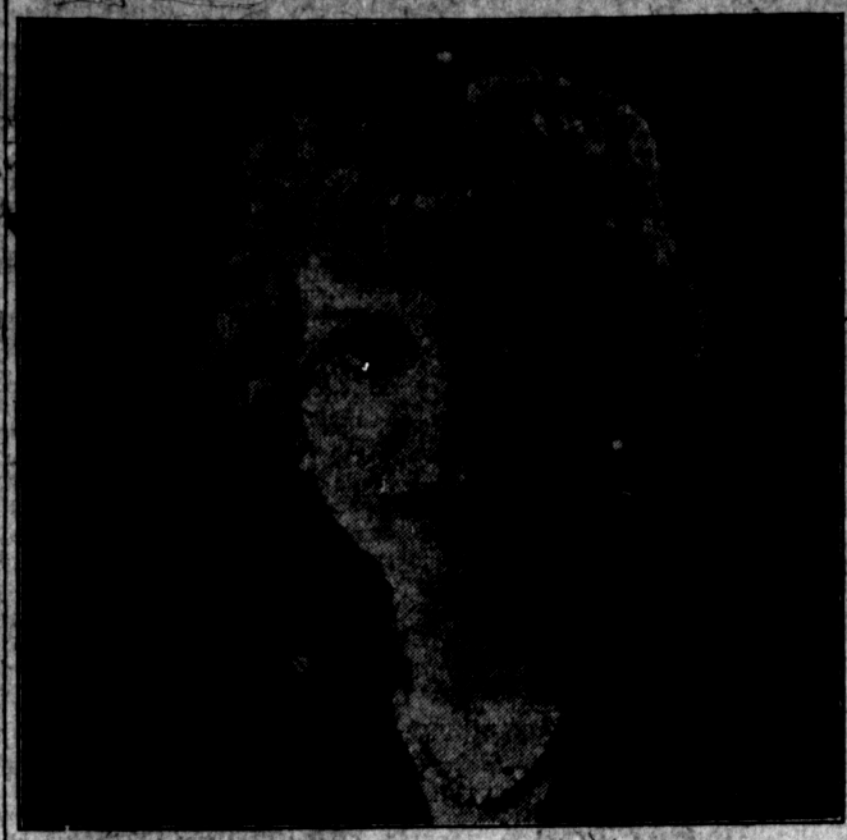

Visitor From Mt. Shasta City—P. C. Sheldon, a resident of Mt. Shasta City, Calif., spent Sunday in this city visiting with friends.



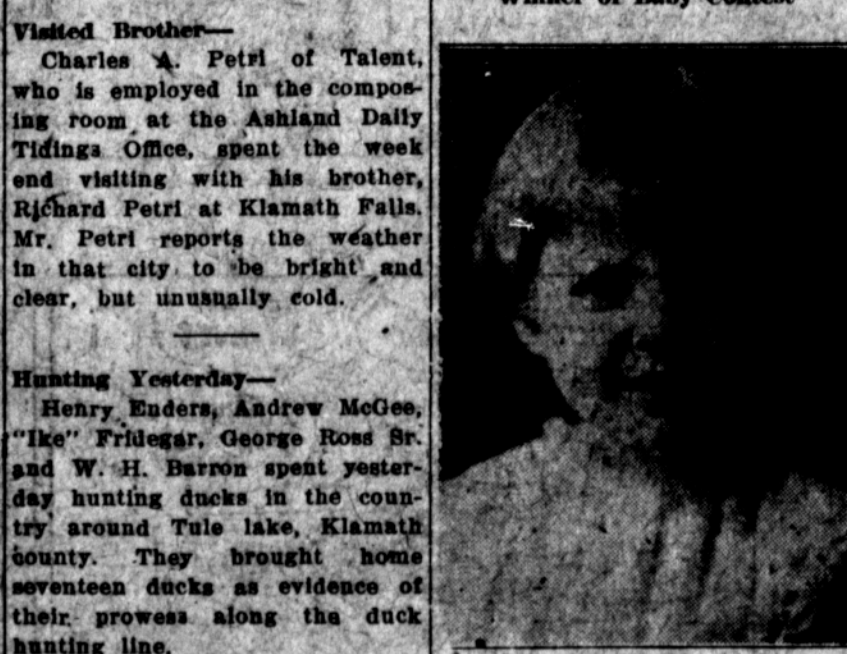
