INITIATIVE BILLS PROPOSED BY THE LEGISLATURE

The following bill will be submitted to the people for a vote at a special general election May 21, 1920. We publish it here so that citizens may have the opportunity of studying the proposed legislation before the date for voting on the measure: Senate Joint Resolution No. 10

Article V

Sec. 8. In case of the removal from office of the governor, or of his death, absence from the state or other inability to discharge the duties of the office, the president of the senate shall become governor until the disability be removed, or until the vacancy is filled at the next general biennial election, and in the case of removal from office, death, resignation, absence from the state or inability both of the governor and the president of the senate the speaker of the house of representatives shall become governor until the disability be removed, or a governor be elected at the next general biennial election. The governor elected to fill the vacancy shall hold office for the unexpired term of the outgoing governor; and be it

Resolved, That the secretary of state be, and he is hereby, authorized and directed to set aside two pages in the official pamphlet containing initiative and referendum measures in which arguments supporting this proposed amendment may be printed; and be it further

Resolved, That a committee of two senators and three representatives be appointed to prepare and file with the secretary of state arguments in support of this amendment; and be it further
