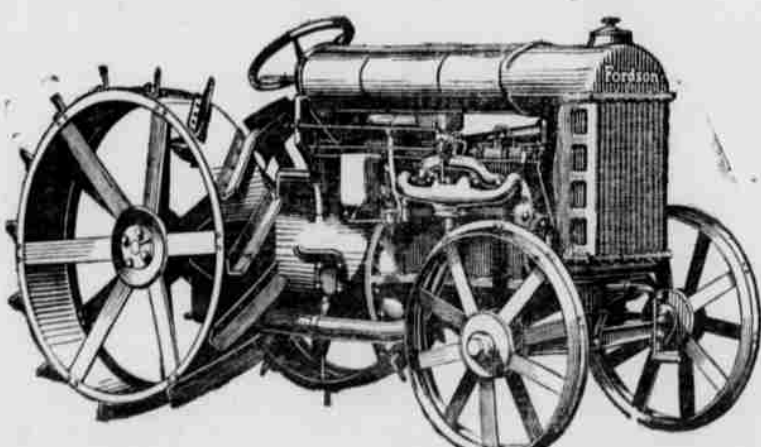

Mrs. Kate H. Dorris and daughter, who have been guests for the past week at the home of Mrs. Ed Heath, left last night for Newburg.

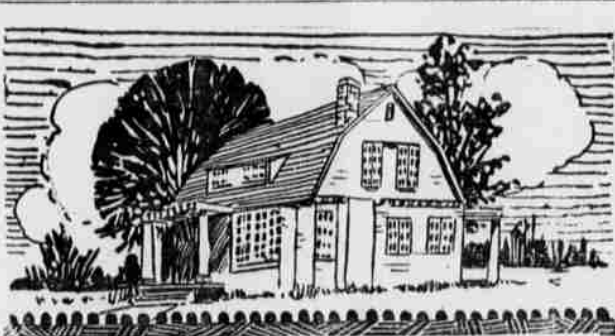

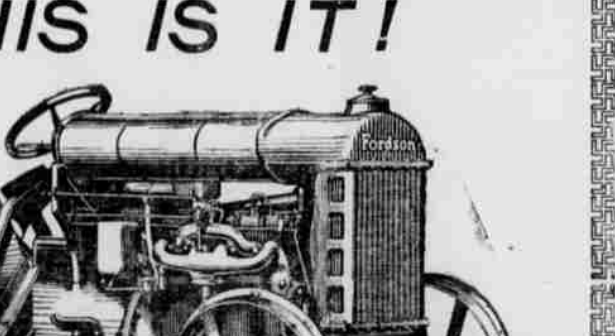
