riage to Millie Powell on the 25th day of December, 1872.

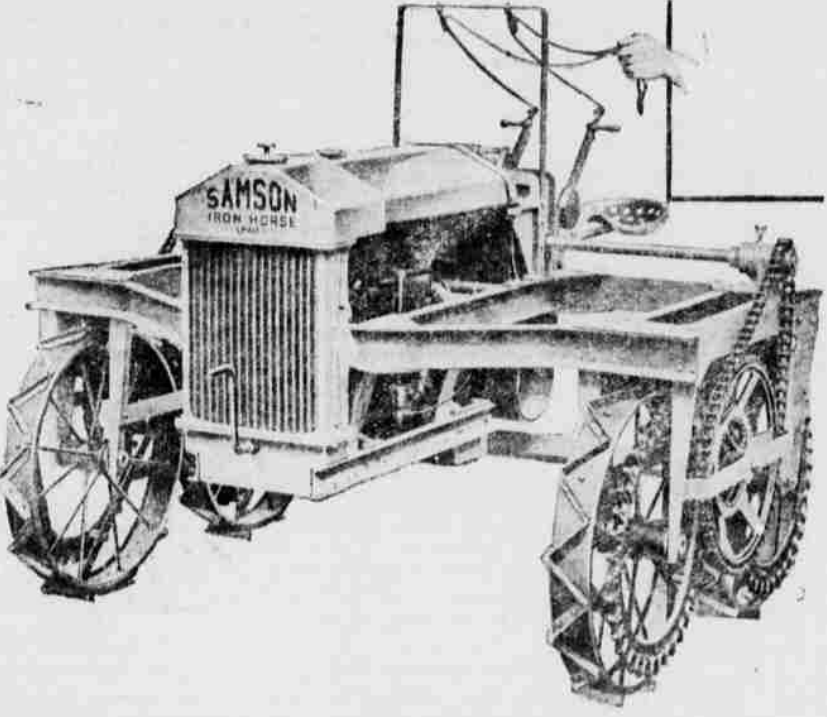
