AGITATE REMOVAL OF COUNTY SEAT

A number of Ashland business men went down to Medford yesterday noon to attend the weekly forum luncheon of the Chamber of Commerce of that city held at the Hotel Holland. As the topic under discussion for the day was the removal of the county seat to Medford much enthusiasm was displayed in a larger meeting than usual. Mayor C. B. Lamkin of Ashland was the speaker of the day, and outlined a vision of the future prosperity he sees of this valley when the highway is completed, irrigation is enriching the country, and Southern Oregon lies basking in the sunshine of prosperity. Other speakers touched on the question of the day before the forum. Ashland visitors included Mayor C. B. Lamkin, J. W. McCoy, E. D. and W. M. Briggs and J. H. Fuller.

It was decided at the meeting the president of the Medford Chamber of Commerce appoint a committee to act in conjunction with a committee from the county bar association to draft a petition to place the removal of the county seat to Medford on the ballot this fall.

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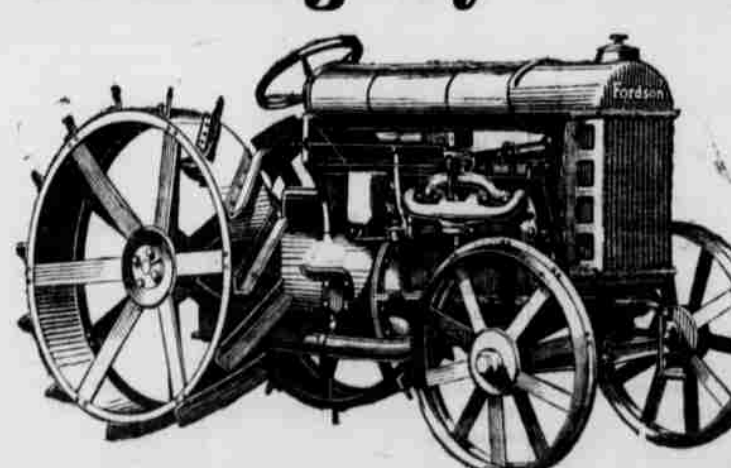
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
