**MEDFORD FOOTBALL
TEAM SUSPENDED**

According to an announcement
given out by J. A. Churchill, state
superintendent of the schools, the
Medford high school has been sus-
pended from the state high school
athletic association until such time
as Medford high school athletic
authorities can disprove charges
of violation of association rules.
The action was taken by the
board of control of the state as-
sociation, composed of A. C.
Strange of Astoria high school,
J. C. Nelson, principal of Salem
high school and Superintendent
Churchill.

A further action of the board
was to declare the football game
played between Medford and
Klamath Falls on October 8 for-
feited to Klamath Falls. The game
was won by Medford, but Klamath
Falls high school entered a
protest charging that Medford
had used ineligible players. These
are said to have been ex-service
men over 21 years old.

Superintendent Smith of the
Medford schools, says he has re-
ceived no official notice, but will
make a statement after it arrives.

**CHURCH TAKES UP
STUDY OF MISSIONS**

The Presbyterian church has for
the time being assumed the guise
of a school of missions. In the

**COLLEGE CHECKS
ARE VICTORIOUS**

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE,
Corvallis—Oregon Agricul-
tural college hens have added an-
other victory to their credit by
winning first place in the all-
northwest egg-laying contest con-
ducted at the Washington State
college at Pullman, according to
Professor Dryden, in charge of
poultry husbandry.

The contest started on Novem-
ber 2, 1919, and was to have con-
tinued for one year, but on July
13 of this year the buildings con-
taining the hens were destroyed
and many of the hens killed by
a storm.

The winning pen was made up
of barred Plymouth Rock hens,
and during the eight months of
the contest they laid 699 eggs or
18 more than the nearest pen.

**Ashland Will Have
A Big Winter Fair**

At a meeting of the board of
trustees of the Chamber of Com-
merce held recently, the proposi-
tion of a Winter Fair was taken
up and it was decided that the
chamber would not only endorse
the plan, but make an appropri-
ation for the carrying out of such
plan, and that committees should
be appointed by the chamber and
the fair be given under its aus-
pices.

The Southern Oregon Poultry
association having agreed to the
proposition of holding the annual
poultry show in Ashland, this will
be one of the leading features of
the fair, and the cackle of the
chicken will be heard loudly on
the days of December 2, 3, and 4.
The place of the big show will
be at the Ashland Armory, prob-
ably the finest auditorium for
such an exhibition in all Southern
Oregon, and Ashland merchants
will undoubtedly make such a
showing of their lines as has never
before been attempted in this
city.

The fruit growers will have as
much space as they may wish to
display the magnificent apples,
which for size and beauty of color-
ing cannot be excelled in Amer-
ica. At this time of year peaches
and pears cannot be expected to
any extent, but any parties hav-
ing such fruits are requested to
retain them carefully or notify the
chamber of commerce that they
may be preserved in cold storage.

The dairy interests will un-
doubtedly be represented, and it
is expected that the creameries
will take advantage of the oppor-
tunity to present Jackson county's
products in this line.
The Jackson County Farm bu-
reau has been invited to make an
exhibit at this time, and they will
undoubtedly take advantage of
the opportunity to show what this
organization is doing for the agri-
cultural interests of the county.
