IMPRESSIVE BURIAL RITES FOR VALLEY BAND LEADER. Harry H. Howell, the well known musician and leader of the Rogue River Valley band, whose death occurred in Medford last Sunday, was buried Tuesday with impressive ceremonies. Concerning this the Medford Mail-Tribune says:

"One of the largest public funerals held in Medford for a long time was that yesterday afternoon for the late Harry H. Howell, well known musician and leader of the Rogue River Valley band, and it was the second time in the city's history that a band led the funeral procession, the other time being at the funeral of Ex-Mayor Eifer.

"Fully 150 people were assembled in the chapel in the Peril Funeral Home, while many more waited outside standing and in autos to take part in the last sad rites. When the body was taken from the chapel to the hearse a brass quartet of the Rogue River Valley band played Gottschalk's 'Last Hope.' Then the marching band led the funeral cortege to the Bear Creek bridge, playing enroute Chopin's funeral march, where they entered carriages and continued the escort to the cemetery. When the body was taken from the hearse to the grave, the band played a dirge selection.

"Mr. Howell was a Spanish-American war veteran, and the blowing of 'Taps' was by Wilson Wait, who acted as leader of the band. The pall bearers, all Spanish-American war veterans, were Alex Sparrow, E. E. Kelly, J. A. Hemstreet, J. J. Buchter, Sam Richardson and Blain Klum. "A vocal quartet consisting of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Andrews, Mrs. Edna Isaacs and C. C. McCurdy sang at the services 'Swear My God to Thee' and 'Lead Kindly Light.' There was a profusion of beautiful floral offerings including a floral lyre from the Ashland members of the Rogue River Valley band, and an emblem from the Eastern Star chapter."
