COUNTY Y. M. C. A. NEWS.

Advices from the state office of the Y. M. C. A. indicate that there is still about \$175 remaining of the Jackson county quota of the Free Educational fund for ex-service men. This is the last of Jackson county's portion of the \$27,273 returned to Oregon from the unpaid funds of the War Work Council. The Council released four and a quarter billion dollars to be used in the United States for educational purposes for ex-service men. This has in most cases taken the form of scholarships. The money was distributed to states and subsequently to counties in proportion to their population. With Oregon's sum, 125 ex-service men have been granted scholarships in colleges, Y. M. C. A. schools, other vocational schools and home study courses. Some of the courses are valued at \$150 and include tools and books. With the \$25 per month granted by the state to any soldier attending school, the plan is offering most unusual advantages to our ex-service men. Any soldier wishing to avail himself of the offer should apply at once to the Y. M. C. A. office, Liberty building, or to Cash Wood, county secretary.

GOOD ROAD OVER MOUNTAINS.

A party of tourists came in from California this morning in their family car, making the trip over the mountains as readily as if it were summer. They claimed that in sections the road was a bit slippery, due to the recent fall of snow, but otherwise they had no difficulty in getting along. They were expecting to go to Marshfield, but from reports north of here it is doubtful if they can reach their destination on account of the heavy rains that have flooded the country.
