Noted Osteopath
Says Cancer Can
Be Prevented

At a meeting of the local osteo-
pathic society last night, held in the
office of Drs. Sawyer and Randall,
at which physicians of Northern Cal-
ifornia and Southern Oregon attend-
ed, Dr. W. Curtis Brigham of Los
Angeles, dean of the post graduate
department of the College of Osteo-
pathic Physicians and Surgeons, and
recognized as one of the foremost sur-
geons of the west, declared that our
present health system was costing
the wage earners of the country more
than \$2,000,000,000 a year. This,
he says, is due to petty politics used
in administering the medical service
required to be obtained through chan-
nels specified by the companies for
whom the wage earners work.

"The physician is, or ought to be,
deeply interested in the progress of
the human race, and if worthy of the
name 'physician,' will give honest ad-
vice to all who seek his services, re-
gardless of the amount to be made
out of the case," the speaker stated.

"Unfortunately, the commercial as-
pect is the only interesting part of
the case to many, and the resultant
quackery has brought the practice
of the healing art into disrepute
among thousands of good citizens.
Scientific research may be organized
to death, so there is danger that
public health may be organized and
legislated, propagandized and com-
mercialized to the point of nullification.

"Surgery, radium, X-ray, or other
treatment for cancer will never solve
the problem. This problem must be
solved with the individual before a
cancer has developed. We can read-
ily see the break of day in the pre-
vention of cancer."

Dr. Brigham, now making a tour
of the northwestern states in behalf
of education, has spent his life work-
ing with various men of the medical
world in scientific research questions,
attending London's greatest clinics,
also Vienna's and Erlich's Laboratory
in Germany.

S. P. STATIONS

The "summer art galleries," con-

stations and waiting rooms. The
practice of issuing the posters, one

Pacific, was discontinued when the

Ashland Auto Camp
Cleaned and Ready
For Summer Guests

"Automobile tourists by the hun-
dreds are already in California await-
ing the opening of the season to make
the trip over the Pacific highway,"
is the word that comes to Ashland
from the more adventurous autoists,
who have braved the cold winds and
fear of snow in the mountains. These
are becoming more frequent as the
word reaches them that travel over
the Cascades and Siskiyou is not the
bugbear it used to be a year or so
ago. Cars are arriving in Ashland
every day from the south, while those
from the north are beginning to ven-
ture south.

In anticipation of a big tourist
travel through Ashland the park
board has been busy getting the free
auto camp in readiness for the sum-
mer visitors. Spring housecleaning
has been going on in that vicinity,
and the park presents the spick and
appearance of the customary home af-
ter the carpets have been beaten, the
curtains washed and the winter stoves
removed.

The floor in the kitchen has been
repainted, the walls stained and all
the lockers cleaned and put in good
condition for the use of the tourists.
The gas plates have been polished,
blackened and are in good working
order, with the gas ready to turn on.
Everything about this building is as
clean and dainty as any housewife
would desire, and will be ready for
use as soon as the paint dries, which
will be early this week if the build-
ing is needed.

Gas has been turned on at the low-
er kitchenette, and this has been in
readiness for tourists' use for the past
week. The plates in that kitchenette
have also been painted and touched
up until they shine like new. The
new fireplace is in readiness for pub-
lic use, and with the gas turned on,
the park is ready for out of door pic-
nics, even though it is not yet con-
sidered picnic season. The thick fol-
lage in the park tempers the cold

breezes, and with the comforts of the
fireplace, the park is as cozy as most
houses.

Not only have the buildings in the
park been renovated, but the entire
enclosure has been cleared up and
swept, and improved. The tables
have been segregated and moved
closer together, allowing more camp
space in the main ground. The new
ground has not yet been opened, but
that will be done as soon as condi-
tions warrant.

Not only has the park board been
active in getting the auto camp in
readiness for the summer visitors,
but the entire park has been under-
going vast improvements. New flower
beds have been laid out and plant-
ed with choice flowers, and a quanti-
ty of new shrubs are expected from
Portland and will be given an at-
tractive position where they will show
to good advantage. A quantity of
dead trees have been taken out and
cut up in to wood which will be stacked
up at a convenient place near the
auto camp ground entrance where it
will be on sale for the use of the fire-
place by the tourists. All dead leaves
have been raked up and removed, the
lakes and streams cleaned and the
grass mowed and raked. The park
at the present time is as attractive
a spot as may be found in the entire
northwest.

Much credit is due the board of
park commissioners for the interest
and attention they are bestowing on
the park this season, which goes far
towards making it the beautiful and
attractive place it is. This board
consists of G. S. Butler, W. H. Mc-
Nair, Frank Jordan, Mrs. C. H. Van-
duel, and Mrs. F. D. Wagner. The
work and attention they are bestow-
ing on the park is making this insti-
tution a name that is far-reaching
throughout the coast country. Tour-
ists go to great pains to reach the
Ashland auto camp where comforts
and conveniences may be gained that
are not available at any other point.

Ohioans Meet in
Annual Session in
Ashland Saturday

The annual meeting of the Ohio
association of the Rogue River valley
held Saturday, March 12, at Chau-
taqua Pioneer hall, will long be re-
membered by the Buckeyes and their
families as the latest delegation
held in many years.

Medford, Central Point, Gold Hill
and surrounding valley points were
represented. One hundred native
born Ohioans and their families were
seated at the first table, where a de-
licious chicken dinner was served. At
the conclusion of dinner an excel-
lent program was thoroughly en-
joyed by all present.

President J. J. Chambers presided at
this meeting, and made an interest-
ing opening address, in which he read
a letter from President Warren G.
Harding, addressed to the president
of the Ohio association in regard to
Admission day. President Harding
stated that on February 19, 1921,
congress declared that Ohio had
adopted a constitution and had be-
come a state of the union.

Musical selections followed, con-
sisting of instrumental music by Dr.
E. A. Woods and family, and a vo-

cal duet by Mrs. E. Smith and Miss
Anderson.

The president then introduced At-
torney H. A. Canaday of Medford as
the speaker of the day. The latter
delivered an eloquent and scholarly

APPLICANTS ARE GRANTED
PERMITS TO USE WATER

SALEM, Mar. 11—Permits for the
appropriation of water have been re-
quested by the following applicants
from Southern Oregon:
Thomas M. Chipman, of Myrtle
creek, for 1 second foot of water
from North Myrtle creek, tributary
to South Umqua river, for irrigating
3 acres; main ditch and pump to cost
\$300.

E. D. Stephenson, of Grants pass,
for .37 second foot of water from
Democrat Gulch, tributary to river,
for irrigating 30 acres; brush and
rock dam, wood headgate and main
ditch to cost \$100.

Joseph Moomaw of Williams, of
.3 second foot of water from west
fork of William creek, tributary to
Applegate river, for irrigation pur-
poses; brush and earth dam, wood
headgate and enlargement of Hoxie
Ditch to cost \$30.

The following applicants have re-
ceived permits signed by Mr. Cupper
and bearing date of priority of March
6th:

Charles W. Smith of Bandon for
1.2 second foot of water from Cut
Creek for placer mining; ditch or
flume, rock dam and timber head-
gate to be constructed; cost not
stated.

William B. Welch of Wellen, Jack-
son county, for 1 second foot of wa-
ter from a spring branch of Yankee
Creek, tributary to Rogue River, for
irrigating 1 acre; one-eighth mile of
1 1/2 inch pipe to cost \$300.

Rogue River Valley Canal Company
of Medford for 300 second feet of
water from numerous tributaries of
the Rogue river in Jackson county,
for supplemental irrigation of 2328
acres. Estimated cost of the project
is \$1,100,000. Construction is now
under way and includes seven main
canals with numerous headgates and
concrete dams. It is expected that
this irrigation system will be com-
pleted by 1925.
