J. H. FULLER TO AID IN LAND SETTLEMENT

John H. Fuller, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, announced this morning that he is making every effort to attend a conference of commercial organization representatives and newspaper editors at Portland, June 7, for the purpose of discussing land settlement plans for Oregon.

The conference will precede by one day the Rose Festival to be held at Portland and is part of the program being carried out by the state Chamber of Commerce to bring homeseekers from the middle western states to Oregon. Those who attend the conference will give special attention to the reception of settlers who are due to arrive in Oregon from the middle west in about 60 days time. William Hanley, state Chamber of Commerce director, who has returned recently from Omaha, reports that the first trainload of settlers are scheduled to leave for this state from Omaha and Kansas City by July 19. He will outline conditions of the middle west at the conference.

The state Chamber of Commerce states the importance of the conference lies in the fact that the land settlement program is the initial beginning of a campaign to be continued next year. In their communication to Mr. Fuller they called attention to the fact that Portland visitors may vote during state election, June 7, at Portland providing they secure a certificate of registration from the clerk of their county.

Local business men who are familiar with the program being carried out by the state Chamber of Commerce expect Ashland to derive a great deal of benefit from the coming influx of homeseekers. Tourists and business men from the middle west stopping at the local hotels state that Ashland is well advertised in the east by motorists who have stopped at the camp ground in this city. Tourists are stopping here in increasing numbers, local garage men state. For the past week registration of guests at the hotels has been extra heavy.

JUNIOR TEAMS AT Y. M. C. A. PLAY LAST BALL GAME

BIG CROP OF RYE AND VETCH GROWN ON ASHCRAFT FARM

Do you remember once looking at a stand of hay that beat anything in the hay line that you ever did see? Well, if you do, and want to see something even better, go up to the Ashcraft place on the Ashland Mine Road and take a look at his stand of rye and vetch.

It used to be thought and probably still is thought by many Ashland citizens that the rugged hills which flank the southern side of our beautiful valley are there for the sole purpose of providing a picturesque setting for the justly proud little city, and incidentally providing some of its fuel. The fact that the greater part of these hill lands is eminently adapted, by reason of location and the fertility and extraordinary water-retaining capacity of the soil, to the raising of the choicest fruit is becoming known; but nobody, not even the old time orchardists of the section, realized the latent possibilities of the soil along other lines of agriculture until P. L. Ashcraft took hold of a 19 acre orchard and demonstrated that land which had been producing big crops of apples without the aid of a particle of fertilizer for 30 years could in one season be made to yield an enormous hay crop.

Mr. Ashcraft, who has grown rye in various sections of the United States says that he has never seen so fine a stand. Many of the stalks stand 7 feet 10 inches high and the stand is so thick that Mr. Ashcraft estimates the yield at 7 tons to the acre.

Making every allowance for favorable seasonal conditions and expert handling these results are a wonderful tribute to the quality of the soil in this, the most picturesque but strangely neglected portion of suburban Ashland. Surely such land—and there is a lot of it—is worth clearing and turning to useful account.
