NEAR EAST RELIEF

He stated that he hoped to visit Ashland soon and publicly thank the city for its co-operation. Mayor Lamkin was chairman of the Near East Relief fund committee. The letter from Mr. Handaker follows:

"Enclosed find receipts for \$211. making a total contribution from Ashland for the China-Near East Relief fund of \$2000.35, in addition to the splendid amount of clothing you recently forwarded us."

"I wish that you would express to the people of Ashland, who for the fourth time have shown their deep interest in the suffering children of the Near East, our grateful appreciation of their aid."

"While the need in the Near East continues unspeakably great and is increasing because of constant warfare between the Turks and Greeks, we have just learned that the situation in China has been relieved by abundant rains and by the unexpected generosity of the Chinese people themselves."

"When the steamer 'Esther Dolan' sails from Seattle for Constantinople the last of the week, she will carry more than 130 tons of clothing, food and toys from Oregon. I hope to be able to distribute some of these gifts myself as I am to spend some weeks in the Near East. When opportunity permits I hope to come to Ashland on my return and to thank the people publicly for their splendid co-operation."

O'DONOVAN, COOK
TAKEN AT ROSEBURG
TO FACE TRIAL HERE
J. O. O'Donovan, former cook for the Good Eats restaurant on Fourth street, wanted by the police here on a charge of taking an automobile purchased on contract out of this county, was arrested in Roseburg yesterday. He will be brought to Ashland either this afternoon or tomorrow for a preliminary hearing before Judge Gowdy. If found guilty his case will probably go to the circuit court.

The car in O'Donovan's possession is said to have been purchased from Jasper L. Loomis on a contract which made it illegal for O'Donovan to take the car out of the county. The car and O'Donovan disappeared from this city June 10. When arrested in Roseburg O'Donovan claimed that he was looking for "help" to be employed in Ashland cafes and restaurants.

DETAILS OF ASHLAND WOMAN'S DEATH ARE RECEIVED HERE

Full details of the death of Mrs. M. E. Gray, well known Ashland woman, who was drowned June 7, in a Montana mountain stream after falling from a foot bridge, are given in a letter addressed to Charles H. Pierce of this city from Olaf Lidstrom at Phillipsburg, Mont.

Mrs. Gray left here about June 1, on a motoring trip to Madison, Wis., in company with Mr. and Mrs. Olaf Lidstrom and Mary Attridge of this city. She was a resident of this city for many years and was a close friend of Mr. and Mrs. Charles H. Pierce who were the first of either friends or relatives to be informed of Mrs. Gray's death. There was some difficulty in locating relatives of Mrs. Gray at the time but through the efforts of Mr. Pierce some distant cousins of the dead woman were located in New Jersey. The letter from Mr. Lidstrom follows:

"Mrs. Gray was drowned in Rock Creek about 20 miles from Phillipsburg at a small place called Moose Lake. The four of us had gone about a mile to get some milk at a ranch house. The road was rather bad and the ranchers offered to go with us over a better trail to a small mill that was working now. To reach the mill we had to cross a narrow foot bridge. Mrs. Bashor, the rancher's wife, crossed the bridge first with her brother, my wife and I next. Mrs. Gray and my sister-in-law, Mary Attridge came last. Mrs. Gray was half way across when she lost her balance and fell in the stream. We tried our best to get her out and got the mill crew within a few minutes. The crew went down the river to a bridge and one man got a hold of her body, without success. We do not think that we will be able to find the body until the high water goes down."

"We had a nice trip all the way here and were enjoying ourselves until the accident happened. We are feeling pretty blue now and I expect that we will stay here until the body is found. We have turned over all the belongings of Mrs. Gray to the coroner here."

TO RELEASE CALIFORNIA MAN HELD HERE
William H. Cook of Chico, Cal., who has been held in jail here since Sunday night on suspicion of complicity in an attempted automobile robbery, may be released, Chief of Police Hatcher stated this morning. Police advice from Chico, Cal., state that the man has in the past been arrested in that city, accused of bootlegging, and that he is a suspicious character.

The Chico police also say that the car driven to this city by Cook was purchased on a contract and should not have been taken out of the city. Early advice from that city intimated that Cook might be charged with embezzlement.

Because no later orders from the Chico police have been received here to hold Cook, Chief Hatcher stated that the man would be released as soon as Cook received money from home. The jailed man claims to have topped at Ashland in search of work.

ARE DYNAMITING SNOW DRIFTS AT CRATER LAKE PARK

Alex Sparrow, superintendent of Crater National Park, who came down from Crater Lake on a flying visit Monday, has had a force of 12 men at work this week clearing the road of snow through the park to the hotel. They are dynamiting on the heavy drifts and with an augmented force will make every possible endeavor to have the road clear of snow to the rim of the lake by July 1st, when the season officially opens.

At the present time there are 25 inches of solid snow packed at Anna

Spring camp, five miles this side of the lake, and big drifts of similar snow between the camp and the lake. The Crater Lake road is now open for auto travel from Prospect to White Horse, which is 8 miles this side of the lake.

GOVERNOR DECLARES CHEESE CONSUMPTION WEEK JUNE 19-20

Full co-operation of the residents of Oregon in a campaign to increase the use of cheese is asked by Governor Olcott in an official proclamation issued yesterday, designating June 19 to 20, "Cheese Consumption week."

During that week, the entire dairy industry, under the direction of the Oregon dairy council, will co-operate to provide cheese of the highest quality at the lowest possible prices. "We produce annually 19,000,000 pounds. Its quality is recognized throughout the entire country, yet our per capita consumption is only one-tenth of what it should be," says Governor Olcott.

"I request the full co-operation of the people of this state in a movement that will encourage one of our best foods."
