Vegetables Need Attention— Many vegetables during October require attention for storing and possibly for seed selection, which should be done before the heavy rains come. Some of the important crops that should be stored are onions, squash and potatoes. The dry spell during the latter part of September has cured the onions well for storage.—O. A. C. Experiment Station.

To Prevent Peach Blight— Peach growers are finding it necessary to spray with Bordeaux 404-50 in the summer or early in the fall in order to prevent the destructive win-

ter attack of peach blight. This disease is responsible for more peach orchard destruction in Oregon than any other single cause, but it can easily be controlled by Bordeaux applied at the right time, providing every twig and bud are covered. The same spray should be used for cankered pear trees.—O. A. C. Experiment Station.

TRIGONIA WELL HAS VERY GOOD SHOWING OF OIL

After drilling operations extending over a period of several months, a half barrel of first-grade oil was taken from the Trigonia Oil company well, two miles west of Phoenix, late yesterday afternoon, according to telephone information from the company's office at Medford this morning. The oil came up in the process of bailing the water from the well, an operation that has been going on for the past several days. The strike was made at a depth of 1,350 feet. It was stated at the Medford office that nothing definite could be said regarding the strike until the well had been cleaned out. It was stated, however, that the indications are very good. Unless the well develops a strong flow, pumping will have to be resorted to in bringing the oil to the surface. News of the oil indications will be received in Ashland with great interest, because of the number of local investors in the company, which has kept steadily at work, despite difficulties in drilling that have been encountered at various times. Sylvester Patterson, of this city, is the president of the Trigonia Oil company. Considerable interest was aroused in the company's activities in purchasing several tracts of land adjoining the well property. Officials and stockholders of the company were at that time highly optimistic over the oil prospects that were developing at the well.
