## DRY ENFORCEMENT

## COST JACKSON CO.

\$3795.60 IN 1921

(From Wednesday's Daily)

Prohibition enforcement in Jackson county up to December 31, 1921, cost \$3795.60, the major portion of this sum being spent for the series of raids conducted last summer. Its cost was \$2870.51, which includes salaries, outlays for evidence, mileage, gas and incidentals. In the December expense list in the war against moonshine, the following items were allowed:

Twenty-three dollars and ninety cents for gas; \$100 salary advance; \$348 to A. B. Gates who collected the evidence in the bootleg trials, and was the star witness thereof; \$454 for salaries and other incidentals.

On the other hand during December over \$800 in fines were collected, by B. S. Sandifer, special prohibition officer in charge, who also assisted in the capture of some speeders.

In the trial of the bootleggers, three pleaded guilty, and served county jail sentences, three stood trial in the circuit court resulting in the conviction of Ernest S. (Dud) Wolganoff, who is undecided whether to appeal the case or serve a three months' county jail sentence, with a \$400 fine. James (Shine) Edwards was tried twice, the jury being unable to agree, the defendant since taking up his residence in Fresno, Calif., after a short sojourn at Weed and Yreka, Calif. John Goodwin was also tried on the same charge, the jury being unable to agree. The disagreements resulted from the testimony of A. B. Gates, which varied so much that the jury refused to convict upon it.

Special Officer Sandifer has a contract with Jackson county for sleuthing until January 15, and the county court is undecided whether to renew it or hire a new man, whose face is not so familiar to violators of the Volstead act. County Judge Gardner expresses the opinion that Sandifer has made a good showing. In view of the fact that the general public has no particular aversion to walking upon the amendment in question, and also believes that bootlegging will not be so funny when the people as a whole grasp its menace.

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## N. Y. AM. LEGION PLANS WORK FOR 1922

NEW YORK, Jan. 14.—"The year of 1922 will be the biggest the American Legion has yet experienced," announced William F. Deegan, state commander of the Legion, in his New Year's greeting message to the posts from state headquarters. "We face the year stronger than ever and we find ourselves facing problems bigger than ever. We are now going to roll up our sleeves, cast aside petty details and head straight for the goal."

"The disabled man is still entangled in red tape. Hospitals are still needed in this state and others for the care of tubercular and mental cases. Thousands of our comrades are still out of employment and facing privation with their wives and children. The ex-service man is still without properly adjusted compensation."

"The radical un-American is still working hard to undermine the institutions of our democratic government and to substitute the soviet form of misgovernment. More and more tolerance is encouraging the foreign-bred agitator to greater and more open violations of our hospitality."

"Our answer must be simple, direct and forceful. We must insist, first, that our wounded and disabled comrades are cared for. We continually hear the cry that 'Nothing is too good for the wounded and disabled' and yet we find nothing being done beyond perfunctory aid from inadequate bureaus. We must insist that economic conditions of those who lost two years of prosperity through their service, be bettered. We must insist that America be kept wholly American in its form of government."

"We cannot accomplish these results without solid and steady growth in our membership. Renew your dues at once; bring in your buddies; talk the Legion wherever you go; make the ex-service man outside the Legion see that this is his own organization for the expression of his feelings; encourage the women's auxiliaries to greater

strength as our valued right arm in the fight for justice.

"We learned in the service that we were happiest when working. Let's keep on working for our country and our community. No Legion year can be counted which does not bring forth constructive efforts. Our strength rests in your post and your post's strength rests in you."

## STATE COLLECTS TWO MILLION MOTOR FEES

(From Wednesday's Daily)

SALEM, Or., Jan. 11.—During the year 1921 a total of 118,615 motor vehicles, including passenger and commercial cars, and 3164 motorcycles were registered and licensed in Oregon, according to a report prepared by Sam A. Kozar, secretary of state.

During 1920 there were 103,780 motor vehicles and 3517 motorcycles. These figures show an increase of 14,825 in the total of motor vehicles in 1921 over the number registered in 1920, and a decrease of 353 in the total number of motorcycles registered.

During the year 1921, 516 dealers in motor vehicles were registered, while during the year 1920 the number of motor vehicle dealers registered and licensed was 751, showing a decrease of 235. The number of chauffeurs licensed in 1921 was 8129, while in the year 1920 the total number was 3394.

The license fees from all sources, that is, for motor vehicles, motorcycles, motor vehicle dealers, chauffeurs and motor vehicle operators registered and for transfers and duplicate license plates, aggregated in 1921 the sum of \$2,334,931.25. For the year 1920 these fees totaled \$2,085,168.50, representing an increase in fees for the year 1921 over those for the year 1920 of \$249,762.75.

During the year 1921 the transfer of 18,675 motor vehicles and 493 motorcycles was reported to the department, or approximately 16 per cent of the motor vehicles registered during the year passed from the hands of the persons by whom they were originally registered.

Of the 118,615 registrations of motor vehicles during 1921, 89,385 of them appear to be re-registrations while 29,239 are registrations either of new cars or of motor vehicles which have not heretofore been registered in the state of Oregon.

## T. B. CATTLE TALK DRAWS A RECORD CROWD OF FARMERS

MEDFORD, Jan. 12.—Animal husbandry day at the Farmers' Week sessions of Tuesday attracted a very large attendance. The main hall of the public library was crowded, and many stood out in the hallway. Yesterday, irrigation day, drew another large attendance and valuable information on this subject was imparted by the several speakers. The Farmers' Week sessions continue until Saturday.

The tuberculosis demonstration in dairy cows and the meat cutting demonstration proved big drawing cards at Tuesday's sessions. The vital importance of the eradication of tuberculosis in livestock was firmly impressed upon the minds of 175 Jackson county people. The visible results of this most dreaded disease will no doubt be the means of securing concerted action in the matter of a thorough clean-up of tuberculosis in all dairy cows in the county.

Prof. Flitts of O. A. C., showed in his best form in dealing with the many phases of dairying. H. A. Lindgren of O. A. C. gave some valuable information in regard to feed feeding experiments that have been conducted during the past year in Jackson county. C. M. McAllister of the Portland Union stockyards, won the hearts of his listeners by the good "horse sense" advice relative to pork production.

The moving picture, entitled "The

Easier Way," made quite a hit and some good wives and mothers will no doubt be placing orders soon for certain home conveniences.

Miss Margery Smith of O. A. C., gave some very valuable and interesting information in regard to selecting food for bone and teeth building properties and an outline of the knowledge necessary for best physical well-being. She asked the women to count their friends who had not a single physical defect—a single filled tooth being a physical defect. In the afternoon she discussed the first step in child feeding.

Today is horticultural day, and not only a good program is being offered the orchardists, but home conveniences are also being shown, and home building for men and women discussed. Forty slides on home building were shown by A. E. Brandt of O. A. C.

Friday is Marketing day. The forenoon program includes wool and mohair marketing, by a representative of the Oregon Wool and Mohair association; marketing activities of the Oregon State Farm bureau, by William Schumlerick of Portland; and poultry products marketed in Jackson county, by Mr. Johnson of the local farm bureau.

In the afternoon wheat and grain marketing will be discussed by a representative of the Oregon Grain Growers association, and the marketing of pears, by Frank Swett of San Francisco, president of the California Pear Growers.
