OBITUARY

THOMAS J. GOODWYN

Thomas J. Goodwyn was born in Fairfield, England, February 14, 1841. His early life was spent in England, where he graduated from Oxford college and held a lieutenant's commission in the English army. Later he spent several years in Australia and New Zealand, afterwards coming to the United States and Oregon, first settling in the Willamette valley.

He removed to Klamath county, where he was one of the pioneers of that section, engaging in the sheep business, and, after the Mexican war, ran a general merchandise store at Bonanza. He has been a resident of the Rogue River valley for the past 22 years.

He is survived by four children, Mrs. Genevieve Sankey of Ashland, and Mrs. Barbara O'Brien and Paul and John Goodwyn of Medford. Mr. Goodwyn was a member of St. Marks Episcopal church of Medford. In recent years he has made his home with his daughter, Mrs. Sankey, at 80 Granite street.

He has been in failing health for the past year, but was not confined to his bed until the last few days. He was nearly 81 years of age.

Interment will be made in Mountain View cemetery from Stock's undertaking parlors at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. Rev. D. E. Millard will be the officiating minister.

YAMHILL MAYOR, FORMER ASHLAND CITIZEN, DEAD

In a special dispatch from Yamhill, Or., yesterday's Oregonian contains the following: Edwin F. Magoon, mayor of Yam-

hill, died suddenly at his home here Sunday night of neuralgia of the heart. Mayor Magoon had been in poor health for some time, but his death was a shock to his family and many friends. Mr. Magoon was born in Iowa March 24, 1868. He came to Gaston several years ago, later moving to Yamhill. As mayor he took an active interest in all local affairs and until a few weeks ago was superintendent of the Yamhill water system. He was a member of the Knights of Pythias lodge of Gaston and the Masonic lodge of Yamhill. Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at the Christian church, in charge of the Knights of Pythias, with burial in the Oddfellows' cemetery west of Yamhill. All business houses closed during the funeral as a mark of respect.
