AUTO CAMP FEE

The wisdom of imposing a fee of
50 cents a day on tourists camping
in our auto park would seem to be a
debatable question which should be
thoroughly threshed out, before the
park commissioners make their de-
cision. There are many who feel
that in imposing the fee we are shut-
ting the door on the most effective
means we have of advertising Ash-
land, and that the return expected
will not by any means compensate
for the loss of that advertising.

In the conference recently held at
Roseburg, one of the arguments ad-
vanced for the imposition of the 50
cents fee was, that no good reason
could be shown why a city should
furnish free camping accommoda-
tions for tourists, any more than it
should be called upon to furnish free
garages for the sake of attracting
them, but the principal argument,
and that which found most favor
among the delegates, was the asser-
tion that the taxpayers would be re-
lieved of the burden of paying the
expenses of keeping up the auto
parks.

Some of the park commissioners
believe this sufficient reason for
charging the fee. On the other hand
it is pointed out by those who are
against inaugurating the fee system,
that if the fee of 50 cents is imposed,
no charge can be made for fuel or
gas, and when the cost of these im-
portant items are deducted from the
50 cent fee, it will be found that
there will be mighty little left to de-
fray the expense attendant upon the
upkeep of the park. At Albany they
have decided not only to stand by the
old system of free camping grounds,
but they announce that considerable
money will be spent this year in mak-
ing the auto camp more attractive
than ever.

The tourist association, in fig-
uring out the cash benefit which towns
receive from the free auto camps,
place the average amount left by ev-
ery auto at seven dollars. Last year
according to the figures given out
by the park commission, approxi-
mately 48,000 tourists visited Ash-
land and Lithia Park. Probably 95
per cent of these came in autos.
Figuring on a basis of four passen-
gers to a car, it would seem as if the
city had more than 10,000 auto vis-
itors. It is easy to figure of what
immediate benefit they were to the
city on a basis of seven dollars a
head. It means that approximately
700,000 were spent here during the
season.

To what extent this would be di-
verted is problematical. The auto
tourists might cheerfully pay the fee
and think they were getting good
value for their money. On the other
hand it is not at all improbable that
their camps will be pitched along
the roadways and the autos will pass
through instead of stopping at Ash-
land.

APPLE AND PRUNE TREE
SPRAY TIME ABOUT HERE

Spraying time comes with growing
time in Oregon. Indeed successful
orchardists beat the first stirrings
of nature and get their sprays on
where protection is needed, while
the buds are swelling, but before
they burst open, says the experiment
station reports.

Protection of apples and pears
against San Jose scale, blister mite
and red spider mites is had by use
of lime-sulfur 12-100 as a dormant
spray. For scale only or for leaf
roller of apples, miscide oil 8-100 is
recommended.

Delayed dormant spray time fol-
lows quickly on the heels of the dor-
mant, especially in sudden bursts of
good weather. When the cluster
buds are separating just enough to
expose to view the blossom buds is
the time for this spray as per sta-
tion reports. Lime sulfur 3-4-100
is the material. For aphids on ap-
ples add nicotine sulfate three-
fourths pound to 100 gallons of spray
solution.

PARENT-TEACHERS
GIVE A PROGRAM

The Civic Improvement club held
a meeting at the parish house on
Second street Tuesday afternoon
and were entertained with a program
given by the members of the Parent-
Teachers association.

Mrs. Gordon MacCracken gave the
origin of the Parent-Teachers associ-
ation, and a few of the things that
were responsible for the forming of
the national organization.

Mrs. Dodge spoke on what the
club is doing today in connection
with the schools, and how various
matters are worked out to the satis-
faction of both parents and teachers.
Mrs. Galey, president of the school
board, was present and gave a talk
about Ashland's schools. She said
the spirit of co-operation was greater
at this time than has ever been
known in the school work of the city.
She urged the parents to stand back
of the schools, both in athletics and
in the study rooms, and thereby
build up a still better school than we
already have. She especially urged
that more parents visit school and
see what is being accomplished there
and when something is said in regard
to conditions in the school that are
not advantageous, to ascertain if the
conditions actually exist before the
information is turned over to some
other individual, for it is by such
means that the schools are damaged.

In speaking of the criticism that
has been directed against the school
board for maintaining the practice
house to train girls in the art of
housekeeping, Mrs. Galey stated that
last year, the board loaned the prac-
tice house \$1200, and that the entire
sum was repaid during the year.
That the house, instead of being an
expense, was making money for the
school district, as four teachers re-
side there, what they pay for the
privilege more than paying the rent
and all expenses.

Referring to the increase in the
number of school children in the
city, Mrs. Galey quoted the following
figures: In 1912 there were 1237
children in the various schools of the
city, this being the record year up
to that time, as there was much
work going on in the city. The war
and other causes kept the attendance
below that mark until 1921, when
the figure went up to 1350. It will
probably go above that mark before
the present year is finished.

There a few more than 340 schol-
ars in the high school at present,
and 16 high school teachers to care
for them. The total number of teach-
ers in the city schools is 41.
A vote of thanks was extended to
the Parent-Teachers association for
the excellent program presented. The
program was brought to a fitting
conclusion by a vocal solo by Mrs. J.
Shortridge. Afterwards a social hour
was enjoyed and refreshments were
served.
