Mr. Ash has been living in New York City for the past three years and is quite well acquainted with conditions as they exist in the metropolis and is able to give some facts in this connection. He states that peaches are selling on the market there now at \$5.00 per dozen and a poor variety at that. In Brooklyn they can be bought at 25 cents each at this season of the year. He states that in season, the prices range about ten cents apiece with the culls being sold at five cents. Mr. Ash is a graduate of the University of Oregon and is quite familiar with the fruit of the Northwest and is among those who enjoy giving a good word for the section of the country where the best fruit in the country is raised.

How to Make A Radio Set

NEW YORK, April 10.—One of the greatest distinctions that can come to the radio fan is that of holding a government license, and one of the requirements for a first-grade amateur license is that of being able to transmit and receive ten words per minute of code, each word averaging five letters. Believe me, fellows, you get a real thrill when you obtain this highly prized "piece of paper." It is well worth the effort.

If you are only listening to telephone broadcasts you are missing the real "thrill of radio." There are countless press dispatches and other news items sent in code.

The writer mentioned in the first article the great advances made by the American radio amateur, and how our government recognized their worth, allowing the liberal use of radio, thus encouraging experimen-

tal and development work. It is only fair that the experimenter offer something in return, and this can be done by making yourself familiar enough with the care and operation of radio apparatus in addition to being able to read code to such an extent that you can qualify for a government license.

Amateurs Advance Radio

It is well to bear in mind that the class of amateurs or private experimenters who have made many advances and patient contributions to the radio art are those who hold licenses, and it is from this class that the government was able to draw a great number of radio instructors for war work. There was not a unit of our military forces that did not have among its members at least one radio amateur. Major-General Squire of the army, on numerous occasions, has given credit to the amateur.

The easiest way to learn code is by use of a telegraph key, buzzer, receivers and battery, and connect as shown in yesterday's column for the detector test. Replace the push button with telegraph key, which may be purchased from any electrical store for less than a dollar. Do not make the mistake of memorizing the code and attempt to read the code that way. The proper and only way is to learn the code by sound, i. e., a dot will sound like "de," and a dash "da." It will require patience and practice, depending of course upon the individual, but it is well worth the effort.

KLAMATH BOOTLEGGERS ON TRIAL IN SACRAMENTO

SACRAMENTO, Calif., April 14.—A jury in the federal court here today is hearing the case in which James Sumpter and John Allen of Siskiyou county are charged with violating the national prohibition act by having in their possession intoxicating liquor and equipment for use in manufacturing illicit liquor.

Officers of Klamath Falls and the Klamath Indian reservation made the raid on a farm house near Calor and took the two men into custody over a year ago, after a long trip through the snow and across an ice-covered lake. Sumpter escaped while the officers were taking him to Klamath Falls, but was later caught.

INSTALLING COLD STORAGE PLANT AT NELDA CAPE

Miss host Avery of the Nelda cafe is getting ready for the tourist trade, which he expects to be heavier this year than ever before. In anticipation of the hot weather he is having a cold storage plant installed which, when completed, will be the most commodious of any in the valley. This will solve quite a problem for the restaurant. Mr. Avery raises on his own ranch all the fruit, butter, eggs and milk he uses, and to keep these things, as well as meats and fish, during the hot weather, is one of the bones of the restaurant business. His cold storage plant, he expects will meet all the demands he will make upon it.
