land on May 27. The address by

Each school represented had en-
trants in the events, and honors
were well divided, though Ruch
school took the lead. Applegate

among them Florence Rock, Pilot
Rock, North Trail, Little Butte,
Pankey, Long Mountain, Table
Rock, Lost Creek, Galls Creek, Elk
Creek and Central.All over this county of Jackson,

rival of eighth grade examination
days, May 11 and 12. Quite an army
of sixth grade pupils are prepared
for the physiology test, and a still
greater number for the geography.High school plays are popular
these days. Medford gave "Clar-

Came Ted," though on different
dates. Butte Falls gives "The Var-
sity Coach," and Jacksonville "A

Makes Trip to Jacksonville—

Dr. D. M. Brower made a trip to
Jacksonville Wednesday morning.Wonderful Scenic Beauty of
Hell's Gate, Near Grants PassFor the mileage represented, prob-
ably the most highly scenic and the
most completely fraught with the
untamed grandeur of the old West,
of any side trip from Grants Pass,
is the 17 mile drive to Hell Gate
and the 13 miles further to old Gal-
lee and the smelter at Alameda.

Historic Interest

This trip down the Rogue river
canyon, along the narrow, winding
stage road, which overlooks the
foaming mountain torrent, where it
still pounds and hews its way
through a wall of solid rock, is one
of the most inspiring short trips in
the west. It typifies your every
thought and vision of what the old
West must have been. As you pic-
ture the six horse stage that once
swung along that tortuous route,
on the gallop, the swaying carriage,
the stealthy redskins, now waiting
the stage for "firewater" and glass
beads, and again awaiting with war-
arrows and vengeance, you catch the
spirit of 50 years ago. You see the
abandoned diggings where once the
flannel-shirted pioneers of the west
sought the fortune that always lay
just beyond reach but just under the
next shovelful of pay dirt. You see
the round saucer-like pits where In-
dian teepees once stood; you get a
cross-section of human life in an age
now past, and a cross-section of geo-
logical ages which run into the hun-
dreds of thousands and millions.

The Route

At about sixteen miles from town
you pass River View farm on which
Judge Twoby, of Twoby Brothers,
contractors, has erected a spacious
summer home with all conveniences
of a city. Another mile takes you
to the solid rock foundation of the
mountains, which now lies broken
by the Rogue, Hell Gate. The road
here leads 200 feet directly above
the waters of the Rogue, a magnifi-
cent example of the constant pur-
pose and the irresistible power of the
Almighty in carrying out His plans.
From here you have eight miles of
wonderful canyon road to historic
Gallego, where many a skirmish was
fought between whites and reds, and
from there five miles more of typi-
cal mountain scenery to the Alameda
smelter.This trip gives you, on the whole
more "scenery per mile," than any
other short trip from Grants Pass,
and you won't regret the gasoline
you put into this excursion.
