SHRINE WILL PUT ON
BIG EVENT AT MEDFORD

Friday will see big doings in Med-
ford among Shrine members of this
section of the state, when they meet
there for a ceremonial at the Med-
ford natatorium, at 2 o'clock in the
afternoon. There will be candidates
from Roseburg, Ashland and Med-
ford.

At 5 o'clock a recess from the
business of the day will be declared
and the members will march from
the natatorium to the Hotel Medford
where the crowning event of the day,
which may be witnessed by the gen-
eral public, will be staged, when
Prof. Wilbur Fitzgerald will dive
from the roof of the hotel into a
tank of water. Prof. Fitzgerald is a
member of the St. Louis Athletic
club and is known as one of the most
spectacular divers in the world to-
day.

Immediately after this thrilling
exhibition the Shriners and their
adies will enter the dining room of
the hotel for the banquet. Upon
completion of the work at the Nat
the big ceremonial ball will be held.
As this is the first ceremonial to be
held in Medford for several years,
the committees in charge are work-
ing hard to make it an affair long
to be remembered.

AMERICAN
LEGION

INDIANAPOLIS, May 22.—Natio-
nal headquarters of the American
Legion has suggested to posts of the
organization that they commemorate
in their Memorial day exercises the
first anniversary of the death of
former Commander F. W. Galbraith
Jr. Mr. Galbraith was killed in In-
dianapolis June 9, 1921 in an auto-
mobile accident. It is suggested that
flags be flown at half mast, that a
picture of Galbraith, draped with
crepe, be hung in post clubrooms,
or that a wreath be placed on club-
room doors.

"Galbraith died in active ser-
vice," the Legion announcement
reads. "He was cut off in the midst
of literally untiring efforts for na-
tion and Legion. On his headstone
may well be inscribed the words:
'Mort pour la Patrie.'"

H. Nelson Jackson, of Burlington,
Vt., the first man to cross the United
States in an automobile, sailed
for London, Eng., on May 20, to re-
present the American Legion at the
annual meeting of the British Leg-
ion, made up of world war service
men of the British Isles. Mr. Jack-
son is one of the American Legion's
national vice-commanders.

An American Legion pilgrimage
to France, Belgium and England is
planned for this summer, and the
steamer President Roosevelt, with a
Legion skipper and an all-Legion
crew, has been tentatively engaged
for the trip. It is planned to start
the trip from New York on July 25,
with the party returning to the
United States on September 3. Only
members of the Legion will make up
the passenger list of 225.

On Memorial day the old wooden
war memorials that glittered with
painted carving in 1919 are to be
burned in accordance with military
regulations by various posts of the
American Legion, according to re-
ports received at Legion national
headquarters. These memorials were
built in the early days of the armis-
tice, and bore on wooden panels the
names of the local dead of the ser-
vice. Of late they have fallen into
decay, having been erected merely
as temporary memorials. The Leg-
ionnaires, remembering army regu-
lations which provide that old
American flags, too shabby for dis-
play, are burned, so that the torn
pieces may never be scattered or
soiled, intend to apply the principle
to the destruction of the old "honor
rolls" to prevent their abuse by sou-
venir hunters.

ADDITIONAL MAIL SERVICE
FOR ASHLAND AND MEDFORD

Additional service of local inter-
est has been taken on by the Med-
ford-Ashland-Klamath Falls tempo-
rary star route, which is carried by
Charles B. Howard's daily auto stage
line in the form of a closed pouch
for Klamath Falls from the Medford
post office. On returning from
Klamath Falls the closed pouch is
opened by the Ashland post office,
and the first class mail for Medford
is dispatched together with the
local mail for Medford by the wait-
ing stage. In this manner the
Klamath Falls and Ashland first-
class mail for Medford will be ad-
vanced about four hours and all
special delivery, general delivery
and lock box mail will be available
at the Medford post office in the
early afternoon.

In addition to this service, a
closed pouch was added a few weeks
ago from Medford to Ashland on
train 53, which expedited the deliv-
ery of first-class mail from Medford
that would arrive in Ashland at 11
o'clock at night. This mail is avail-
able now in lock boxes, general de-
livery and special delivery at about
5:30 p. m.

The Ashland post office remains
the main dispatching point for all
other trains to and from Klamath
Falls on the temporary star route
service.

ALLIGATOR ON EXHIBITION
IS PRESENT TO THE CITY

A real live alligator is being ex-
hibited at the McNair Brothers drug
store which was sent them from New
Orleans, La., by J. J. McNair, former
proprietor of the East Side drug
store, with instruction that it be
given to the city as a present. Two
alligators were sent in the box, but
one died on the way. Instructions
were sent as to what to feed it, but
to date it has refused to partake of
any food since arriving in Ashland.
It is feared that the water here is
entirely too cold for it to live in,
and the park board has not decided
what to do with it.

AUTHOR OF "TIPPERARY"
IS ORGANIST AT VINING

It is only a comparatively short
time since the best there was in mu-
sic was found to be an essential in
the motion picture business. For a
long time it was thought, that all
that was necessary—all that the
public cared for, was a bit of har-
mony that would keep time with the
movement of the film, and to some
extent, at least, be in harmony with
the plot on the screen. But audi-
ences have progressed with as great
rapidity as have the improvements
in screen productions, and now de-
mand that there shall be absolute
accord between the screen produc-
tion and the music.

Perhaps that is the reason that
the author of "Tipperary" and a
score of other musical compositions,
presides at the organ in the Vining
theater, in the person of Alice Jaye
Smith, who after a long absence has
returned to Ashland and intends to
make her home here. She is well-
known in the musical world as a
composer, and has written words
and music for a number of songs
that have made "hits" and on which
she now draws royalty. In filmdom,
however, she is best known as the
originator of what is known as the
"cue sheet" for synchronizing music
to the film, a system whereby the
music in time, tone and theme, is
made to fit the film. It is consid-
ered a great advance in the musical
world, and Ashland may consider
itself fortunate that the Vining man-
agement has secured the author of
the "cue sheet" as the conductor of
its musical programs.
