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JUNE'S THE MONTH

To fish.
To sell the roosters.
To cut the clover hay.
To open the ice house.
To adjust the cream separator for
thicker skimming.
To sow millet. It's a fair feed

will mean a lot if a dry spell
comes.

To keep plenty of salt before the

ing. Any one can make good butter
in the cooler months, but few know
how in the summer.—Farm Life.

PARK BOARD READY TO
GRANT CONCESSIONS

The park board have finished ar-
rangements and are now ready to
grant concessions for the Fourth of
July celebration in Ashland.

The space along the walk has
been divided off into sections of
eight feet each, and these will be
let for the celebration for \$15 each,
with an additional charge of \$1.50
a front foot for more space. All
spaces reserved will require a de-
posit of one-fourth at time of mak-
ing reservation, the balance to be
paid on or before June 26. All space
not paid for in full on that date will
be offered for rent again on the fol-
lowing day and the money advanced
will be forfeited.

While the park board will not
guarantee the right of any lessee to
operate a concession not within the
law, Mayor Lamkin has made the
statement that any concession which
comes within the state laws will be
allowed to operate without interfer-
ence from the local authorities.

BUDGET FUNDS
READILY GIVEN
BY MERCHANTSCOMMITTEE REPORTS NEARLY
ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS
RAISED IN DAY

Response Has Been Unusually Good,
Merchants and Others Cheerfully
Subscribing for Budget Which En-
cludes July 4th Celebration.

The budget committee for the
chamber of commerce started the
canvass for funds for the work of the
organization yesterday morning, and
will continue today and next week.
C. H. Pierce is chairman of the com-
mittee, and he and V. O. N. Smith,
G. F. Billings and A. C. Nininger
were the workers yesterday, and
others will assist from now on.

Mr. Pierce reports a splendid and
encouraging response to the canvass
made by the committee in most in-
stances. It should be understood
that this budget includes all the
undertakings of this community for
which funds are solicited, such as
publicity, including literature, adver-
tising, signs and markers and mail-
ing of literature. Support and main-
tenance of the normal school and
furthering the installation of a per-
manent school in Ashland. Carrying
on celebrations such as the coming
4th of July and other events. Sup-
port and assistance to the develop-
ing of the highest type of agriculture
and livestock breeding, through such
means as the winter fair, the cow
testing association and the poultry
association. Entertainment of con-
ventions and guests to the city, such
as the G. A. R. assembly, the Farm
Bureau picnic, Jackson County
School day, etc. Carrying on of ath-
letic sports, programs, music and
band concerts, and many other items
which arise from time to time.

By making the canvass for all
these items at one time, the mer-
chants and those who are usually
called on to contribute for these
community events, avoid a continual
demand and no solicitors are permit-
ted except with the endorsement of
the chamber. Those who are not
subscribers to the budget, however,
may be solicited for July 4th and
other matters mentioned, from time
to time, as it is not fair for some
to avoid any obligation whatever.

LEG CRUSHED WHILE
HELPING UNLOAD TRUCK

Clinton Arnold, of Medford, who
has been employed for some time as
inspector for the state highway de-
partment, was badly hurt Friday
while trying to assist the driver of
one of the large construction trucks
dump a large load of sand. The hy-
draulic hoist had lifted the front of
the dump body to the full height,
and Mr. Arnold was trying to pull
the lever to release the load, when
the cables parted and let the body
of the five-ton truck fall, catching
his leg between the body and the
frame, which, fortunately, are about
two and a half inches apart. While
the leg was badly crushed, it is be-
lieved that it may be saved.

Thirty minutes time was spent by
the ten or twelve men on the job
in efforts to release the injured man.
As soon as he was released he was
placed in a car and rushed to the
Sacred Heart hospital at Medford
for medical attention.

ALLEGED WHITE
SLAVER TAKEN
IN HOTEL HEREMAX ROSENBLUM AND "BILLIE"
WARD ARRESTED UNDER
MANN ACT

Seattle Sheriff Has Felony Warrant
for Rosenblum and Wants Girl
Held as Witness in White Slavery
Prosecution.

Night Officer Webster Wertz last
night took into custody, Max Rosen-
blum, 32 years of age, and a young
woman known as Billie Ward, who
had registered at the Columbia ho-
tel, as "J. L. Jarber and wife." The
arrest was made on a telegraphic
request from Sheriff Matt Starwich,
of Seattle, who notified Chief Hatch-
er that he held a warrant for Rosen-
blum's arrest on a felony charge.

Rosenblum was taken to the city
jail, where he is held awaiting fur-
ther instructions from the Seattle po-
lice. The young woman, who is
pretty and about 24 years old, is in
charge of the police matron, and
will be held as a witness, perhaps
as an accessory for violation of the
Mann white slave act.

Night Officer Wertz saw the Ford
truck in which the pair had driven
from Washington, parked on the
street in front of the hotel. The po-
lice had been notified to look out
for such a truck, bearing the license
number 218,127, and as this was
what the police were looking for, it
did not take long for Wertz to locate
the ostensible owner in the Columbia
hotel.

Rosenblum was taken to the po-
lice station and locked up, and the
young woman was turned over to the
care of the matron. Their baggage
was placed in the vault, and the
truck stored in the Ford garage.

This afternoon Chief of Police
Hatcher received a telegram from
Sheriff Starwich of Seattle, stating
that an officer from the United
States department of justice, would
arrive in Ashland some time tonight
and would take charge of Rosenblum
and the young woman.
