IMPROVEMENTS AT MARBLE
CAVES FOR VISITORS

GRANTS PASS, May 31.—There are a great many improvements noticeable this season at the Marble Caves in Josephine county, which will make a trip to this wonderful marvel of nature more attractive this year to tourists than it has ever been before.

M. M. Lewis is the district ranger with headquarters at Page creek, and he is familiar with every nook and crevice of the district over which he keeps vigilant guard for Uncle Sam. Dick Rowley is the guide at the caves and is in charge of the camp grounds. His duties, so far, have been to act as guide and keep the grounds in order. There is plenty of room to camp at the caves, with wood and water. The camp ground, however, is 800 or 900 feet distant from the end of the road with which it is connected by trail. There is a loop at the end of the road which would furnish parking space and room for rather crowded camps for about 15 cars.

This year there will be restaurant service and tent houses for accommodation of the public. Meals will be \$3 per day. Lodging will be \$1 per night. A charge of 50 cents is made for the guide service, which includes the use of acetylene lamp and a suit of coveralls, freshly laundered.

The road from the forest boundary to the caves is 8.2 miles long, has a maximum grade of 6 per cent and is 12 feet wide over all, with frequent turn-outs. This part of the road will probably be open by June 10, but since this is its first year, it will probably get soft and rough before fall. It is not surfaced. There is a crew at work on Section 2 of the Caves highway from the forest boundary west to the county road. This section will probably not be finished until some time in August. It crosses the old road several times and the old road is rough. In addition, there will probably be blasting going on during working hours. However, it is expected that cars can get in, particularly after working hours, by June first.

Meals and lodging can also be obtained at the Lind ranch at the forest boundary. Section 31, just inside the forest boundary and on the Caves highway, is an O. and C. section. It has plenty of good camping places on Sucker creek and Gray back creek, but they are not improved. Practically the only route from Medford to the Caves is by the Pacific highway to Grants Pass and the Crescent City road to a point about a mile beyond Kirby, then to Holland, then about three or four miles north to the Caves highway.



The road is gravelled as far as Holland. From there to the Caves highway it is dirt road, and the last mile or so is pretty rough. It is expected that a stage will run from Grants Pass to the Caves daily during the season.

The improvements inside the caves consisted of widening some of the smaller passages between the large chambers, putting in iron ladders to replace the wooden ones formerly used, and constructing trails through some of the rougher chambers inside the caves. The material for the ladders is on the grounds, but they are not all installed yet.

BABY CLINIC IS HELD

AT CENTRAL POINT

Another most successful baby clinic was held at Central Point last Thursday afternoon in the high school laboratory room under the direction of the Central Point committee of the Jackson County Health association. This is the second clinic, held here, followed in the wake of the first one, which took in babies under two years of age and which was one of the most interesting and gratifying clinics ever held any place in the state. So successful was it that it was decided to have another one taking in all babies from two to four years of age, and that one was the one held Thursday afternoon.

KLAMATH BONDS
ON SALE FOR
ROAD PROJECT

KLAMATH FALLS, June 12.—Early commencement of road work in Klamath county is forecast in the advertising by the county court for bids for \$400,000 of the \$800,000 road bond issue authorized by the voters in the special election. Bids will be opened June 24.

According to members of the county court, funds derived from the bond sale will be allotted in part as follows: Rock creek road, \$75,000; Midland road, \$40,000; Crater Lake road (estimated), \$26,000.

A large share of the fund will go to paving of The Dalles-California highway from Fort Klamath to the Deschutes county line, a distance of 70 miles. The county will pay 25 per cent of the cost. The county's share is roughly estimated at \$210,000.
