Household exhibits at the fair should demonstrate standards of excellence in cooking, in sewing and other needlework and in handwork of various kinds. For this reason score cards for household exhibits at fairs have been prepared by Mrs. Jessie D. McComb, in charge of home economics extension of Oregon Agricultural college, and will be available for anyone wishing copies.

"The lake?" wrote Joaquin Miller, in Sunset Magazine, "The Sea of Silence? Ah, yes, I had forgotten—so much else; besides, I should like to let it alone, say nothing. Here are some of the standards: CANNED FRUITS: Canned fruit should be uniform in size, shape and degree of ripeness, carefully prepared, evenly packed, and not overcooked. It should be clean and of natural color. Syrup should be clean and not too heavy, free from sediment and not too abundant. CANNED VEGETABLES: Canned vegetables should be uniform in size, medium mature, neatly packed, have a natural flavor and color, small proportions of liquid, and be firm but well cooked.

JELLY: Jelly should be clear, sparkling, and with no sign of crystals, retain its shape after removal from glass, should be the natural color and have the flavor of the fruit. It should be tender, should cut easily with a spoon, and yet be so firm that the edges of the cut edges remain. No foreign substances should appear in jelly. The container should be clean, with a closely fitted lid and a neat label.

late "Bard of the Sierras" was game; he said: "The lake? Ah, yes, it beggars description. Words utterly fail," etc." But when once you have gazed down on those waters of sapphire and indigo blue, you will realize how futile is the effort of the writer, painter or camera man to produce anything that thrills one as one is thrilled by a first hand view of Crater Lake.

Looking down for the first time on this mystic body of water, one is caught up in a swirl of emotions; for the moment neither you nor it seems a part of this earth. Startled, you look down at your feet, to the rocks you stand on, and to close-by firs, for reassurance; and perhaps you heave a sigh of relief when your glance back to the lodge finds it in its accustomed setting.

The aboriginal inhabitants of the region, the Modoc and Klamath Indians, it seems, experienced this same feeling, or one akin to it, long ago, even as the white visitor does today. It was beyond their understanding, and it frightened them. It filled them with awe, and they had no wish to be awed. So they classified it as "bad medicine" and tabooed the lake.

The Volt can confidently prescribe Crater Lake as good medicine. In the opinion of critical judges of natural beauty, like Joaquin Miller, who traveled far and wide, to see what he could see, Crater Lake is one of the most beautiful spots in America. The lake itself is not all; as the bard heretofore quoted observed, there is "so much else." The Volt will forego any attempt to set forth the wonders of the Crater Lake national park. Instead it refers its readers to the literature on this subject issued by the department of the Interior, obtainable through the National Park service, Washington, D. C., the chambers of commerce at either Ashland, Medford or Klamath Falls, from the railroad offices, and from the American Automobile association.

Ashland, Medford and Klamath Falls are gateways to Crater Lake. The majority of visitors to this national park, whether traveling by train and auto stage, or in their own machines, start from one city and rely by way of the other, thus covering new country and viewing new scenery throughout the entire trip.

THREE ASHLAND LADS HIKE TO MT. ASHLAND

Roy Parr, William Kannasto and Donald Snyder took a hike to Mount Ashland yesterday and report having had a delightful trip. They left town about 7 o'clock in the morning and walked on dry ground until about a half mile this side of Griddle Camp, where they encountered the first snow, and from that point to the summit the snow continued to get deeper, it being about 12 feet deep at the crater.

The boys reached the summit at about noon, and after setting their lunch, explored some of the surrounding territory and located the red snow which is found by hikers to the peak, and filled their thermos bottle with the peculiar formation, and brought it home with them. They described the red snow as being in layers about an inch thick, in between which was ordinary snow. The snow has melted away from the bodies of the trees, leaving holes to the ground, and making walking a difficult matter, for should one slip into one of these holes, which are ten or twelve feet deep, it would not be an easy matter to reach the top again. The boys left the summit about 3 o'clock, and were back in the city at 7, having made the trip down hill in easy fashion.

They picked up the injured man and brought him to the city, where he is resting easily at the sanitarium today.
