JAMES BOYD DIES AT HOME HERE LAST NIGHT

James Boyd died at his home at 317 North Main street last night about 9:30 o'clock. He was 81 years of age, being born in Livingstonville, N. Y., August 9, 1840. He lived there until, as a young man, he came to St. Paul, Minn., where he engaged in business and made his home there until the year 1900, when he moved with his family to near Bly, Oregon. Here he lived until 1908, when the family moved to Ashland, renting the present home on North Main street, which was after purchased and became the family residence.

Mr. Boyd had the misfortune of being deaf, and therefore did not make as many friends as he otherwise would, and lived almost altogether with his family. His vision began to fail about a year ago, and he was compelled to give up the privilege of driving his car, which he had greatly enjoyed up to that time.

He was a thirty-second degree Mason and a member of the Presbyterian church of St. Paul.

Mr. Boyd leaves surviving him, besides his wife, three sons and two daughters—Fred Boyd of Seattle; James Boyd of Nampa, Ida.; George Boyd of Bly, Or.; Mrs. R. A. Lares of San Francisco, and Mrs. J. C. Ferguson of this city.

Funeral arrangements have not been completed, but Mr. Boyd's request that his body be shipped to St. Paul for burial will be observed. H. C. Stock, funeral director, will have charge of the arrangements in Ashland.

A wedding breakfast followed the ceremony, and the couple left the same day for the south, expecting to visit Yosemite and return by Crater Lake and Pelican Bay.

DRUNKS PAY FINES AND ARE GIVEN FREEDOM

Charles Erickson, Leonard Johnson and Gus Ogren were arrested Wednesday night at the Union rooming house where they were boisterously celebrating, and were locked up on the charge of drunkenness.

They were taken before Justice Gowdy yesterday and assessed a fine of \$25 and a jail sentence of 15 days each. They refused to pay the fines at the time and were taken back to jail to lay out the sentence, but upon further reflection in the barred room in the city building, decided that it was no place to spend the bright summer days and asked to be allowed to pay their fines. They were taken back before the court and paid up, whereupon the court suspended the jail sentences during their good behavior.

GEORGE CLINE FINED IN JUSTICE'S COURT

George Cline, who was arrested in Medford Thursday evening on a charge of driving with a dealer's license when he was not a dealer, was taken before Justice Gowdy this morning and fined \$25 in addition to a jail sentence of 30 days. Upon the payment of the fine the jail sentence was suspended, and he was released from custody.

LOCAL GARAGE MAN ARRESTED IN MEDFORD

George Cline was arrested last evening in Medford by Chief of Police Timothy, and he'd until local officers arrived to bring him back to Ashland later in the evening. He was arrested on the charge of driving a car with a dealer's license attached, when he was not a dealer. In addition, it is thought by local authorities that he was leaving for distant parts with the large red car which he had secured from Harrison Brothers, and did not have title as yet.

He is being held in the local jail until he calms down so that he can be taken into court and given a hearing.

Cline has been in the city only a short time, and has transacted a great deal of business on practically no capital whatever, having first rented the Lithia garage, but upon his failure to pay rent, was ejected by Mr. Smith, the owner. He then rented a garage on Pioneer street, and was apparently getting along in fine shape.

He appeared before the city council Tuesday night and asked permission to make a driveway over the sidewalk between the Yockey Realty office and the Jordan Electric store, stating that he had rented the vacant lot there and was going to install a place to wash cars.

It now appears that he had all of his belongings in the car with him when arrested in Medford, and was avoiding the down town section in an effort to get through that place without being caught.

WILL PLACE FLAGS ON MAIN ST. FOR JULY 4TH

The commercial club has made a proposition to the Civic club that will help the latter earn a little more money for the club house fund. Mr. L. F. Ferguson has a plan to beautify Ashland by placing flag holders on 33 electric light standards radiating from the Plaza. These will be constructed at the Ashland foundry and sold at cost, as the contribution of the foundry. The city council voted \$25 toward the holders, provided the flags be subscribed for. The fixtures will be permanent. Each holder will support eight flags and will lend an air of festivity to many occasions. Their first use will be on the Fourth of July, when 264 American flags, 12 by 16 inches, will gadden our patriotic eyes.

Mr. Ferguson will have the flags placed in the holders and have them collected afterwards, that they may be used many times. Other sets of flags will be made from time to time, one set appropriate for Christmas decoration, which will make the use of trees tied to the posts unnecessary, and save our fir trees from wanton destruction. Visiting Shriners or W. C. T. U. delegates might be welcomed with flags with but little work in advance.

For the coming Fourth of July celebration, Mr. Ninsinger will provide flags at cost, and the Civic club will sell them for 25 cents each. The eight flags at each light post will cost \$2. Mr. Ninsinger has bought flags for his corner at the regular price, and the sale of separate flags began with Miss Derrick, so help furnish flags for one of the 33 holders as soon as you are asked, and make Ashland another of the many towns where people pull together. A receipt will be given to each purchaser, and each receipt will be numbered. A large flag, four by six feet, will be presented to the holder of the lucky number, which will be placed in a sealed envelope

and kept at the commercial club until noon of July 4. As the old song puts it, "Everybody is doing it."

Mrs. Julian is the only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. Mirsch and is a graduate of the local high school and taught in the Rogue River schools during the past year. She has been an active member of the Presbyterian church and the Christian Endeavor society.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, June 22.—(Special.)—Ashland appears to have won the scholarship championship of the state, if there is such a thing, according to the announcements made at commencement. George Verne Blue, specializing in history and rhetoric, has a record which seems to be the best made in the university this year. Besides taking honors in general scholarship, in which he maintained an exceptionally high average, he captured honors also in both history and rhetoric and capped his year's honors by winning the Edison Marshall prize for the best story written on the campus this year. Mr. Blue goes to the University of California this fall to do advanced work on a teaching fellowship awarded him on the basis of his exceptional work here.

Two other Ashland students, Troy Aubrey Phipps and Peter Lincoln Spencer, are listed among the 20 in the senior class who have won honorable mention for high general scholarship. Mr. Phipps has been specializing in physics and Mr. Spencer in education.
