FORDSON CARAVAN DUE

IN ASHLAND IN FEW DAYS

A caravan of Fordson tractors from Portland will arrive in Ashland shortly, after the Fourth to give demonstration of what can be done by these versatile machines. The caravan will be made up of about 22 Fordson tractors and Ford trucks and will come over the highway under their own power. They come directly to Ashland, without making any demonstrations en route, but will stop on the return trip at all points where a demonstration is considered practicable.

Besides Oregon agents and dealers of the Ford company, a number of officials from the Ford factory will accompany the caravan, and a so-called "Standard Oil company" and the Oliver, Plow company.

The party carries their own lighting plant with them, and have a radio equipment with which to send out information to the outside world of the day's accomplishments.

The advance advertising man will be in Ashland on July 5 and will make arrangements for the demonstration and announce the places and dates where the same will be given.

CANNERY BUSY WITH

ROYAL ANNE CHERRIES

The Rogue River Valley cannery is preparing to put up double the pack of last year, have put in a refrigerating plant, evaporator, another \$3000 cooler and other new machinery and equipment to meet their demands, says the Medford Mail Tribune. S. Scholla, the manager, is very much pleased over the outlook for this year's pack and is anxious to get all the cherries, blackberries, beans, tomatoes, and later peaches and apples that he can and will play the best prices possible.

They are now canning Royal Anne

cherries and will follow with blackberries and other vegetables and fruit as their seasons come on. When in full operation they will employ from 100 to 200 men, women and girls.
