Editor of the Forum:

The cost would not equal that of the Ashland election bill.

What right has a church pastor to take a bunch of recall papers into his pulpit on Sunday and hold it up and talk about it? What does he get for it? If Terrill did wrong, there is a clean, clear-cut way through the grand jury to oust him. I don't believe he is guilty of what he is charged with. My opinion is that some meddler wants to get him out and then try for a grab at the county seat, and is using the W. C. T. U. and a few preachers to rake out their chestnuts.

The Editor of the Ashland Daily Tidings, Ashland, Ore., U. S. A. Dear Sir:

We beg to state that we had the pleasure of receiving copies of your paper from the Ashland chamber of commerce. May we ask you if you could send us a copy now and then, say once a month, in order that we have recent copies before us in the event of inquiries for papers like yours reaching us.

May we also ask you if you can place a few lines in your columns to the effect that the Bureau voor Handelslichtingen, (Foreign Relations Office), Oudebrug 12-16, Amsterdam, offers its services, free of charge to all visitors from the U. S. needing addresses in Holland either for export from or for import into the U. S. This office, established in 1903, subsidized by the Dutch government and patronized by H. M. the Queen Dowager of the Netherlands, has two sample rooms, one for Dutch manufactured products and one for overseas produce. Their library contains books and journals concerning all parts of the world. Any visitors to the bureau, who are provided with a bona fide bank introduction, may interview in our localities any firms they wish to speak to, in order to avoid the loss of time incurred by calling on merchants all over the country.

turned at the Boulevard and counter-marched to the starting point. The committee which was responsible for the success of the Fourth of July parade was composed of Lithians, with Donald Spencer as chairman and Karl P. Nims, James Southard, J. return to service promptly on your previous regular assignments. You have no quarrel with the Southern Pacific, therefore this strike is against the Government because the United States Railroad Labor Board whose decisions you protest is the Government under the law.

The findings of the board will be upheld by public opinion. Your salaried leaders and their families will not suffer the loss and privations that will come to most of the rank and file who fail to return to the service and those who are dear to them. I believe you are without full realization of the grave consequences of your action and want to give you the opportunity of correcting your mistake before others are employed to take your places.

Those who report for duty promptly will have their seniority pension and pass privileges restored without prejudice. After 7 a. m. July 6th, 1922, those who fail to report for duty at the regular starting time of the shift on which they last worked shall forfeit the privilege of being returned to the service and their former places will be considered vacant and open to newly employed men.
