VICTIM OF WEED SHOOTING IN CRITICAL CONDITION

WEED, Calif., July 6.—Guiseppe Fortunata, one of ten men shot Sunday, when G. Sharboro ran amuck in Weed, is in quite a serious condition in the Weed hospital. In addition to a shattered right arm, he was shot in the back, considerable scab entering his kidneys. There is grave doubt as to his ultimate recovery. Reports from Yreka indicate that it probably will be necessary to amputate Sharboro's leg to prevent blood poisoning. Several relatives from Weed visited him Monday.

RECALL IS FILED AGAINST SHERIFF C. E. TERRILL

The petition for the recall of Sheriff Terrill has been filed at last and it is found that the greatest number of signatures to the petition are those of Ashland citizens. The filing was made yesterday by the Rev. W. Judson Oldfield, pastor of the Congregational church, of Ashland; Stella Leavitt, said to represent the W. C. T. U. of Ashland, and Minnie Bryant, said to represent the W. C. T. U. of this city. The petitioning party was accompanied by Attorney H. A. Canaday and Frank Redden of Medford, and two women.

It was claimed by those having the recall petitions in their charge that 1700 names had been signed. It is claimed that a large per cent of the signers were women, and that the largest number of names were secured from Ashland precincts. From the 1700 names the signatures of about 200 signers, who have filed written and telephonic requests that their names be withdrawn, will be subtracted.

Petitions nominating D. M. Lowe, farmer and fair exhibit collector, to make the race as the recall candidate, were also filed.

Under the law, the official whose recall is sought, is given five days to resign, which will not come to pass in this instance, as Sheriff Terrill has announced he will not. If the checking shows the required number of names—1235—it is then the duty of the county clerk to call a special election within 20 days, which would bring in the latter part of the last week of this month.

No specific charges are filed against Sheriff Terrill, the recall being based upon the following allegations:

"Non-performance of the duties of his office.

"For malfeasance in office as set forth in the published report of the 1921 grand jury, of which Mr. J. W. Eldon was foreman."

With the filing of the recall petitions, rumor got busy and on all sides it is reported that the crusade against the sheriff is only the beginning, and that petitions will later be filed in an effort to make a clean sweep of the county offices.

AUTO ACCIDENTS MAY COST DRIVER STATE LICENSE

An auto accident occurred Wednesday evening about 6 o'clock at the intersection of Oak and Main street, in which the Buick car belonging to Ed Weber, of Medford, was hit by a car driven by A. E. Anderson, of Ashland.

Mr. Weber was traveling north on Main street and had signaled that he would turn at the corner, but was compelled to come to a stop until another car traveling south had passed and it was during this stop that Anderson, coming down the hill at a good rate of speed, hit the hub of the buick with the left front spring of his car, resulting in the springing of the body of the Buick entirely out of line, and the bending of the machine's iron spring holder.

Mr. Weber was not hurt, but the car was damaged to any serious degree.

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
