

AUTO HURDLES NEIL CREEK: 3 HURT IN SMASH

ESCAPE FROM DEATH ALMOST MIRACULOUS WHEN CAR LEAPS STREAM

Machine Was Speeding at Sixty Miles an Hour When It Airplaned Over Rocks and Was Wrecked on Creek Bank.

An automobile accident occurred on the Pacific highway Saturday evening at the crossing of Neil creek near the Fred Homes ranch, when a high powered, new Oldsmobile roadster traveling towards Ashland left the highway about 100 feet before reaching the bridge and raced over the rocks and boulders at the side of the road and came to a stop only after having leaped over the bank of the creek.

Those who visited the scene of the accident and looked over the ground say the machine must have been going at the rate of about 60 miles an hour, as from the time it left the grade, it practically airplaned over 30 or 40 feet across rocks and boulders until it came to a halting smash on the banks of the creek.

The machine is the property of Mr. Rodenhamer of Portland and was being driven at the time of the accident by Mr. Mann of Portland and they were accompanied by Mrs. William Belmont of Bend, Oregon. Mrs. Belmont was the most serious hurt of the trio and will probably be confined to the hospital for some time. Mr. Mann is still in the hospital and is suffering from some bad cuts and bruises while Mr. Rodenhamer was able to be on the streets today.

The automobile is almost a complete wreck, the wheels having been almost completely demolished, as was the wind shield, top and steering wheel. On one side, the hood was badly bent, and the right hand running board and mud guards were torn off and the body of the car was thrown considerably out of line.

The Automotive Shop salvaged the car and it is now at their place awaiting orders of the owner, who has not yet decided what he will do with the car.

MAIN AND GRANITE STREET AUTO CLASH ON CORNER

An accident at the corner of North Main and Granite streets has occurred at last.

Mrs. Cecil Norton, in her father's new Maxwell car, was coming down Granite street toward Main street, and started to turn north on that thoroughfare when a car from Medford coming south on Main street appeared and Mrs. Norton was unable to clear the right hand side of the street before the other car arrived. The result was that the left front wheel of the Medford car was completely demolished, and the fender bent double.

The Reinhardt car, which Mrs. Norton was driving had the left hand running board torn off and both doors on that side of the car were badly battered and bent.

It was fortunate indeed that some one was not injured in the accident, for the crash was heard by people living as far as two blocks away from the scene of the accident.

MACHINE RUNS AWAY ON BEACH AVENUE

Mrs. J. M. Hughes had an accident Saturday night at the corner of Beach and Gresham streets that brought all of the neighbors thereabouts out to see what had happened and they were surprised to find so little damage with so much noise.

Mrs. Hughes had driven their closed car up Gresham street and turned the corner into Beach Avenue and then continued to turn until she was in the L. Hilly yard and drove directly against the new pizzeria posts at that place, tearing one of the posts entirely off and pushing the other post some three feet off of its base before bringing the car to a halt.

The car was only slightly damaged and no one was hurt beyond a nervous shock which was suffered by the driver of the car and the Hilly family, who thought that the house was being torn down about them.
