LOCAL PASTORS RETURN FROM OREGON SYNOD

JESSE WINBURN STARTS MOVEMENT WITH \$500 TO GET PROJECT ON WAY

Plan 25 Miles of Scenic Panorama, Taking Visitors to Top of Mount Ashland on an Easy Grade, From Flowers to Snow.

A notable gathering took place at Sap-and-Salt yesterday afternoon, which, in its significance and future results, is liable to become historic.

Mr. Winburn entertained as his dinner guests Fred C. Homes, John H. Fuller and Charles H. Pierce, and late in the afternoon piloted these gentlemen to the end of the forest service road which ends three miles from Mr. Winburn's resort home, at an elevation of about 6000 feet above sea level. From the end of this road, a good trail leads a distance of two and a half miles to the summit of Mount Ashland, which trail Mr. Winburn states can be converted into fully as good a road and on practically the same engineer's grade as the present completed three-mile section of forest service road above Sap-and-Salt.

This three-mile section of road leaves the bed of Ashland creek a quarter of a mile above the Winburn home and climbs rapidly, but on fairly easy grades, to the present terminus of the road.

The striking feature of this road, and the one most commented on by this party of Ashland men, was the soil formation, being nearly all decomposed granite with practically no lava rock or reef rock exposed, a formation, which it is stated, exists almost to the very summit of Mount Ashland.

It does not require a road expert to state positively that the widening of the present forest service road, and its extension to the summit of the mountain, presents scarcely any greater road problem than the building of a similar scenic road on the hills within the city limits of Ashland. The ease of handling this road improvement was so apparent to all that it came as a revelation to the party of good road enthusiasts. They were, of course, expecting something fine in the way of scenery, but even that surpassed all expectations.

Mr. Winburn, who has traveled over a great part of the world, said he knew of nothing else like it in Europe or America, and the other members of the party agreed that nothing along the Rogue river route except Crater Lake itself could surpass the possibilities of a scenic drive system covering the two forks of Ashland creek canyon and Mount Ashland.

About a year ago, Mr. Pierce, in a public letter agreed to donate \$100 per year for a five year period to start a fund for this scenic drive system, which offer he now repeats, except that he agrees to put up the entire \$500 as needed. Mr. Winburn yesterday gave his check for \$500 to Mr. Pierce without any strings or conditions, as a starter toward building eventually a 25-mile drive system covering the greater portion of the Ashland watershed.

The four gentlemen resolved themselves into a preliminary ways and means committee to give this project immediate impetus, and agreed to meet again next Sunday afternoon at Sap-and-Salt, with forest service and county road representatives, with perhaps an engineer or two to discuss tentative plans. Mr. Winburn, with his characteristic energy, hopes to see quite a bit of actual construction accomplished before the snow flies.

It is not contemplated in these road plans to open up the Ashland watershed to campers or picnickers, but to assist the authorities in most right enforcement of rules for visitors. Messrs. Homes, Fuller and Pierce commented heartily on the extremely neat and sanitary condition of the entire Winburn premises, and they also spoke highly of his personal co-operation with the forest service authorities in elimination of all camping and grazing on his own 160 acre mountain ranch, a distinct gain over conditions prevailing under the old regime, supplemented by close and personal watchfulness of all of the adjoining mountain region around Sap-and-Salt by Mr. Winburn and his assistants.

WOODLAND, Calif., (July 18.—Miss Pearl Hurst, head of the women's committee raising funds for Miss Opal McNaughton, sole survivor of the auto bus wreck at Proberta on November 30 last, when 14 Red Bluff high school students were killed outright, reports that she has sold \$500 worth of tickets to the benefit dance to be given here Wednesday. The history, discovery and formation of Crater Lake, the wild life and wild flowers, fish, trees, place names, Indian legends, and the story of "the statue of a lady" carved on a great boulder near government camp. The botanical information with halftone reproductions is decidedly interesting as are the geological notes.
