REPUBLICAN LOVE FEAST AT MEDFORD IS SUCCESS

The republican love feast Wednesday evening at the Hotel Medford at Medford was a thorough success, and everything went off without a hitch. The banquet was served promptly at 6 o'clock, and was accompanied by music furnished by the Lounspach orchestra and Carl Loveland, of Ashland.

After the banqueters had finished the meal, they were treated to a vocal number by a Medford quartet. J. W. Wakefield, chairman of the Jackson county central committee, presided over the meeting and called upon Mayor Gates to introduce the new state chairman of the republican party, Walter M. Tooe Jr., who was present to meet the local party leaders and lend any help that lay in his power.

Mayor Gates, in explaining his position, said: "God knows I am independent enough, but not enough to think that I can get along without the republican party," and further added that, despite the fact that it was a hard pill to swallow, he intended to back the entire republican ticket.

Following a masterful republican speech by Mr. Tooe, Mr. Blanchard of Grants Pass gave a short talk, and was followed by Bert Anderson who in turn called on several prominent republican who could give a good word for the party.

HERD OF ELK PROPAGATING IN SHASTA NATIONAL FOREST

REDDING, Calif., Aug. 18.—Several years ago the Elks lodge at Redding shipped 50 elk from the Yellowstone park and had them placed in the Shasta national forest. About half the herd died soon after they were liberated. The remainder have increased up to about 60 head and are now located on Brock, Lick and Flat creeks, and on Brock mountain. Last year several calves were seen. It is believed this herd has now become permanently established and will continue to increase in numbers.

A third child, Helen Miller, will be married to Clarence E. Broberg of Kenosha.

JACKSON COUNTY FAIR IS NEARLY READY FOR OPENING

MEDFORD, Aug. 18.—(Special.)—Jackson county will dedicate a new \$60,000 fair grounds this fall with a monster display of agriculture, horticulture, dairy and general farm products, commercial and industrial exhibits, and entertainment including automobile and motorcycle races and other lively and interesting features.

Substantial buildings have been erected, a high speed race track provided, buildings and equipment have been laid out systematically, and the enterprise is in the hands of experienced and enterprising Jackson county residents, who are determined to make Jackson county's fair an annual institution of educational features.

THEODORE F. SMITH DIES AT HOME HERE

Theodore F. Smith died at his home on Granite street at 9:30 o'clock last evening. He was 67 years of age.

Mr. Smith was born of Quaker parents in Bucks county, Penn., in 1855. He came to Ashland in May, 1900. Since that time he has served the city and county in various capacities, having been on the city council for two years, served six years as county fruit inspector, and was then appointed park superintendent here, which position he filled for two and a half years, resigning the place only a few months ago. While superintendent of the park, he worked intelligently in an effort to make the parks of Ashland something the people of the city would be proud of, and was successful in this endeavor beyond any possible doubt.

He is survived by his wife, Bertha L. Smith, two sons, Theodore H. Smith of this city and W. Forest Smith of Camp Meade, Md., and one daughter, Mrs. Virginia Schrans of San Jose, Calif.

Funeral services will be held Saturday morning at 10 o'clock from the Methodist church, and interment will take place in Hargadine cemetery in charge of J. P. Dodge and Sons, funeral directors.

FIRE DESTROYS BOX FACTORY AT DORRIS

DORRIS, Aug. 19.—Fire at 5:30 o'clock Thursday afternoon totally destroyed the box factory here of the Associated Lumber & Box company, with a loss estimated at \$116,000, believed to be covered by insurance.

The fire was believed to have originated in the open sawdust burner from which the burning sawdust was blown by a high wind into the factory where the fire gained strong headway before being observed.

About 500,000 feet of finished box shooks, of an estimated value of \$20,000, which was located in an adjoining warehouse, was also totally destroyed. Three million feet of lumber nearly was saved.

Efforts to extinguish the fire failed through low pressure of the water supply.

COMPETING THIS WEEK FOR MILITARY HONORS

SHERIFF CRACKS SAFE, CORRALS LIQUOR CACHE

KLAMATH COUNTY SLEUTH AND FEMALE DETECTIVE SWOOP DOWN ON MALIN

Sheriff Lloyd Low Manipulates a Locked Safe and Female Sherlock Holmes Springs Secret Panel in Wall, Getting 75 Quarts of Booze.

MALIN, Or., Aug. 21.—Arrest of Lloyd Furlatt, with a barber shop in the Malin pool hall, and of Guy Ross, proprietor of the place, and confiscation of from 75 to 80 quarts of alleged moonshine, resulted from a raid by Sheriff Low and Deputy Barnes on the Malin pool hall and an adjoining residence, in which the cracking of a safe by the sheriff and the services of a "lady detective" were outstanding features.

Acting on information that liquor was being sold at the pool hall, the officers, accompanied by Miss Mildred Carr, special deputy, who in civil life is a teacher in the Astoria schools, swooped down upon the place. Ross, the proprietor, was absent, but Furlatt was in charge. Investigation disclosed behind the bar, several empty bottles from which a decided moonshine odor emanated.

Now the sheriff had reason to believe the safe was the hiding place of liquor which was meted out to well known customers, he said, and he demanded of Furlatt that the safe be opened. Furlatt, however, professed ignorance of the combination. Nothing daunted, the sheriff at once started to work on the dial. His efforts were rewarded when the door swung open, revealing, he said, a pop bottle containing a quantity of alleged moonshine, as well as several whiskey glasses.

Now enters the detectress, Miss Carr, who had her suspicions roused by hammering in the residence quarters of the building. So the officers started a search, going through sundry boxes and tapping the walls for secret chambers. At length an innocent looking bed was pulled out from the wall and disclosed a section of the wall which had been removed and recently nailed up again. The boards were removed and there stood 75 full quarts of alleged moonshine.

Returning to Klamath Falls with the evidence and with Furlatt under arrest, the officers met Ross, who was also required to accompany them. Later both were released, under bonds of \$400 each.

STRIKING SHOP CRAFTS HOLD AN OPEN MEETING

An open meeting of the Southern Pacific striking shop crafts was held in Moose hall Sunday evening, and was addressed by Walter Nash, general chairman of machinists on the S. P., and C. F. Grow who represents the railway employees department of the American Federation of Labor.

Mr. Nash's address was confined to strike conditions now in effect on the S. P. and the causes leading up to the same, which he asserted was the unreasonable and unjust decision handed down by the United States railway labor board.

He stated that the roads were advertising for men to fill the places of the men on strike at wages set forth in the labor board's decision No. 1036, but as a matter of fact the S. P. was paying some of them as high as \$20 for eight hours, and when required to work 16 hours, the company has paid \$40 for the additional eight hours, making \$60 for 16 hours continual service.

C. F. Grow, the principal speaker, explained in detail the causes leading up to the present struggle and attributed it to a desire on the part of a group of bankers in Wall street, and industrial associations to crush labor organizations. He said that, only as a last resort, to secure some measure of economic justice, did John Lewis for the miners, and B. M. Jewell representing the six shop crafts, sanction a strike.

"LADDIE BOY" HAS SON—IS HELD FOR SCRAPPING

NEW YORK, Aug. 17.—Laddie Boy, the first Alfrede of the land, has a five-month-old son living in West New York. The offspring of the White House dog got his name on the police blotter today when he was found scrapping with another pup in a vacant lot. He was held for his owners, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Coffelt. He ran away from home four days ago. The young Alfrede bears the name "Happy Boy," and his distinguished ancestry was made known only after he had been brought home.

FIRST DEER REPORTED KILLED BY R. W. SNYDER

The first deer reported killed during the open season was brought in to the city by B. M. Potter yesterday morning about 10 o'clock, and was shot by R. W. Snyder on Little Elk creek.

It was exhibited for a few hours at the Nininger & Warner pool hall, where quite a number gathered about and speculated as to how much the animal would weigh, the guesses running from 140 to 200 pounds. Scales were procured, and they balanced up at an even 160 pounds.

CARAVAN FROM PORTLAND PAYS ASHLAND VISIT

MAYOR BAKER MAKES SPEECH FROM FIRE ENGINE ON PLAZA

Seventeen Civic Organizations Were Represented in the Caravan of 20 Automobiles on a Boosting Tour For 1925 Exposition.

The Portland 1925 Exposition caravan arrived in Ashland last evening right on time, and after raising quite a fuss with horns and sirens as they passed through the city, driving as far east as the library and then returning to the Hotel Ashland, where they were met by Secretary Fuller of the chamber of commerce, and a few business men of the city.

In the absence of Mayor Lamkin and W. H. McNair, president of the chamber of commerce, at the time of the arrival of the caravan, Councilman Pierce and Fred Holmes, vice president of the chamber, acted as the official representatives of these bodies, and greeted the Portlanders to the city.

Very little preparation had been made to receive the visitors, as they had sent no word to Ashland since leaving Portland, and a great many people were doubtful whether they would show up in the city during the evening, which accounted for the few people who were on hand to receive them on their arrival.

After the members of the caravan had eaten an excellent dinner at the Hotel Ashland, the siren at the engine house was set to work, and this effort was successful in getting out a fair sized crowd to hear the message that the caravan brought to the city. Permission of the city officials was obtained and the fire engine was run out on the Plaza, where Mayor Lamkin officially received the visitors for the city, while Secretary Fuller spoke for the chamber of commerce, after which Mayor Baker of Portland was introduced and explained the purpose of the caravan was to get permission of the people of the state to hold the fair, stating that Portland would stand the taxation end of the game and asked nothing of that kind from the rest of the state. After a short address which held closely to the point in question, the mayor bid the citizens a kind good night, and expressed the hope that he would see them all in Portland in 1925.

While the photographers were on the ground, no pictures were taken, owing to the small number of people who turned out. The pictures that are being taken along the route will be shown all over the country, and only pictures of large crowds are wanted.
