Funds Needed to Keep up Work on Dead Indian Road

If the Dead Indian road is to be completed in accordance with the agreement with the state highway commission, which insures the road being taken over and kept up as a state road, it will be necessary to raise funds, and Louis Dodge, Jesse Nell and E. P. Moore are soliciting subscriptions for that purpose. The former is working in the city of Ashland, and Jesse Nell and E. P. Moore are working to the same end in the country districts. The latter reports that up to date he has secured subscriptions amounting to \$800.

Under the arrangement with the state highway commission, \$5000 worth of work must be done every year on the road until completed. The county court announced that it would go fifty-fifty, and is now expending \$3000 on the road. The remainder must be made up by private subscription. Should a lapse be made during any one year of expenditure of the amount agreed upon, the agreement, under which the state would take over the road and provide for its future upkeep, would be jeopardized. Under these conditions it is essential that the fund be raised at once so that the work can be done before the snow flies.

MRS. PAUL WALTER DROWNED NEAR KLAMATH FALLS

KLAMATH FALLS, Aug. 18.—(Special)—Mrs. Paul Walter, of Steinman, Oregon, near Ashland, was drowned this morning about 7:30 o'clock in Crystal creek at Malore Springs about four miles from Rocky Point. Details are lacking, but Postmaster A. C. Allen of Rocky Point stated that Mrs. Walters and her husband were out fishing and were trying to change positions in the boat when it capsized. The body was recovered two hours later in 16 feet of water. Mr. Walter is in the employ of the Southern Pacific company, and has been located at Steinman as day operator for the past two years. They came to Oregon from Louisiana.

Mrs. Walter is survived by her husband and a three-year old baby girl. A sister of the dead woman lives at Tacoma, Wash.

SPEEDWAY AT FAIR GROUNDS WILL BE A CLASSY AFFAIR
