"CANNING WEEK" URGED BY OREGON C. OF C.

PORTLAND, Sept. 12.—To assist in the relief of the fruit growers of the state who are hard hit by the present rail strike, the Oregon state chamber of commerce has suggested that the week of September 18-23 be designated as "Canning Week," to be observed throughout the state, during which housewives will be urged to can a two years' supply of fruit for family use.

Communications suggesting "Canning Week" have been sent to more than one hundred commercial clubs and chambers of commerce in Oregon. Governor Olcott has been requested to place his official stamp of approval upon the project.

It is pointed out by state chamber officials that the rail strike has curtailed car service to points east, especially in regard to refrigerator service, with the result that bumper fruit crops in Oregon are in danger of being lost through lack of market. An increased volume of home canning will do much to relieve the situation, it is believed.

Crater Lake Lodge To Close Sept. 20; Visitors Increase 3400 Over Last Season

Visitors to Crater Lake park numbered 3400 more this season, up to August 31, than to the same date last season, breaking all previous records, according to figures furnished by W. A. Kamp, resident manager of the Crater Lake lodge.

The total number of visitors this year was 26,868 against 23,444 for 1921. This season, 7612 automobiles entered the park, up to August 31, against 6429 to the same date last year. The percentage of increase is 18 per cent for cars and 15 per cent for visitors.

The lodge will close this year, September 20, Kamp said. It has been customary to close October 1. Work on an addition on the west end of the lodge that will double the room accommodations is progressing, but it is not planned to have the rooms ready for occupancy before the 1924 season. If the 1925 fair materializes it is expected to greatly increase the park patronage, but even under the present ratio of increase, the addition will be badly needed by the time it is completed.

Sunday and Labor day, a double holiday, drew a large crowd of local people to the lake, swelling the crowd of patrons to a point where all rooms in the hotel and most of the tent houses were taken. The addition will contain 85 rooms when finished, virtually doubling the present lodging capacity. The foundation and walls are being built of rock from the vicinity. The new management has done much this season to overcome old animosities and prejudice. They are endeavoring to create a friendly and satisfied spirit all around and are succeeding.

The kitchen supplies and other needs are purchased as impartially as possible, considerable business going to Klamath Falls that did not come there under the Parkhurst management.

The laundry work is done in Klamath Falls and much of the meat supply is bought there. Fort Klamath supplies the hotel table with much of the milk and butter used. Courteous treatment of guests and fair dealings with everyone with whom the hotel does business is the new policy and it is proving a successful one.

FAIR FORTUNE TELLER NIPS TRUSTING CLIENT

CHELSEA, Mass., Sept. 12.—Police of this city are searching for a fair young fortune teller who fleeced Konstante Telone of \$1900—the savings of his entire life.

The victim said the fortune teller offered to make a money belt for him, and advised him to keep all his money in it. This he did, he said, withdrawing his \$1900 from the bank and putting it in the belt. At another appointment with the fortune teller, she took the belt to examine it and then gave it back. When Telone appeared for his third appointment she had disappeared. He then examined his money belt and found the money had disappeared.

MYRTLE CREEK HAS NEW WATER SYSTEM

MYRTLE CREEK, Or., Sept. 12.—The water from Harrison Young creek was turned into the main pipeline of the new water system of the town of Myrtle Creek last week, and the inhabitants of this town are now enjoying over abundance of pure mountain water. This supply of water is delivered at the old reservoir within the town from the Harrison Young creek through a six inch concrete pipe, 11,648 feet in length.

The pipeline has nine inverted syphons and crosses eight ridges. The intake is 240 feet higher than the outlet at the reservoir, the new gold is once more being hoarded—head being 200 feet at ed. It's the "blood clot" in the Dead Horse syphon. A pressure "re-

HOARDING OF GOLD IS TERMED A DISEASE

YOUNGSTOWN, O., Sept. 12.—Present industrial disturbances, such as the shopmen's strike, is giving the nation a disease similar to that which happens to an individual when the flow of blood is checked by a clot. A. E. Reinman, president of the Central Savings and Trust company here, asserts.

"Banks and business generally were getting to a place where they were breathing easier," Mr. Reinman said. "We could see prosperity just ahead when the coal and rail strikes came. A sure sign that the mental attitude of the people had changed—a most important factor in prosperity—was the amount of gold that was hoarded in through bank windows by all kinds of people. In times of depression there is always a hoarding of gold."

One of our customers deposited \$600 in gold he had kept hidden away since the first hard times of 1920.
