GALLONS AND GALLONS
OF CONFISCATED BOOZE
MAY SOON BE RELEASED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—

The government may have to release 250,000 gallons of whisky seized from shops flying foreign flags outside of the three mile limit. The status of such liquor, and also the arrest of hundreds of persons charged with conspiracy to violate the revenue laws came before the department of justice today.

Federal district attorneys are swamped by appeals from the defendant's attorneys asserting the government should dismiss the cases, some of which have been pending for two years.

The attorney general is expected to issue instructions clearing the issue soon.

The release of the Canadian schooner "Emerald" with a thousand cases on board is said to set a precedent which other owners will stand on.

WINBURN IS FETED AT BIG BANQUET IN CIVIC BUILDING

ASHLAND COMPLIMENTED FOR BEAUTIFUL CLUB

HOST OF DONOR'S FRIENDS PAY
HIM GLOWING TRIBUTE
SATURDAY

Speakers Unanimous in Voicing Approval of the Attractiveness of the Building and of Motives Prompting Its Erection.

Limited only by the facilities of the building, a host of friends of Jesse Winburn tendered him a banquet in the newly completed Civic club building Saturday evening. In perfect harmony with the season, the rooms were beautifully decorated with fruits and autumn leaves, while the spirit of Halloween was also embodied in the decorations. Special guests at the occasion were Walter M. Pierce, of La Grande, and Mrs. Frank Irvine, wife of the editor of the Portland Journal. B. R. Greer presided as toastmaster.

"I came to Ashland when I thought I had found the most beautiful spot in the world," remarked Jesse Winburn, in response to urgent requests for a few words, after a few fitting remarks by Mr. Greer, stating the motif for the dinner.

"When I found the building was to be used for children to a great extent and when I found that the further construction of the building had been stopped by lack of money, I felt very sad. I love children. When I first learned of the building I was much surprised, and now as I look about me and see the finished effects, the interior decorations so tastefully carried out by the ladies of the city, I find that I had not dreamed of such a beautiful building. I wish that I could do much more for the people of Ashland because they deserve it. If I can do things like this, what more can I expect! The very thought that I am permitted to be here and have so many friends is enough. As God is my witness, I forgive those that have sought to put obstacles in my path, and I hope that they will forgive me."

Senator Walter M. Pierce, of La Grande, in response to a call from Toastmaster Greer, said:

"I am very glad to be in Ashland again for a day and see the gem of the south country, and this fine building, and to be able to sit beside the donor. I wonder how any man, who for so many years lived in the cold atmosphere of the business world, could, after being discouraged, learn that his inspiration came from Charlie Loomis. What a novel it would make! How I wish that I might be permitted to write it! Charlie Loomis is happy tonight because he has done something. Jesse Winburn is happier tonight than he was while piling up one thousand dollars upon another. Life is worth living to anyone who does something for others. The keynote of true happiness is service."

"The ladies of Ashland have the reputation in Portland of being the best civic workers in the state," declared Mrs. Frank Irvine, in saying a few words. "I am sure that with this beautiful building, this community will take the lead in this sort of work in the state."

"I want to compliment you on the splendid results you have attained in the rearing of this building," Charlie Loomis said. "It will stand as a monument to the intelligent energy of the women of the Ashland Civic club. This is a splendid building, reared for the purpose of supplying this city with a public place suitable for the entertainment of visitors who may come here both from abroad and from the territory adjacent to Ashland. It is in keeping with Ashland's hospitality."

"I want to say to you that while among many of the essential things Ashland needs, besides more water, more lights, a big hotel, more co-operation, is more Jesse Winburns. Not only for the generous gifts he has made the city, but the spirit of advancement and achievement he has exercised."

"I feel highly complimented in being allowed the privilege of being present at this time, when we have with us as distinguished a visitor as our probable incoming governor—Walter Pierce."

"And to the people of Medford, had I the chance to address them, I would say that the six successful years "Pop" Gates has steered them through, his work will stand a shining mark long after he has passed to private life."

"I wish to say a few words along the line of getting behind our own producers and manufacturers.
