REFUTES RUMOR
ABOUT CANDIDACY

STATEMENT BY CHARLES L. LOOMIS

In order to settle some misunderstandings and misgivings in regard to my candidacy for mayor, I desire to make the following statement, and will ask the Tidings to print it as an advertisement:

I am charged by some factions as being the candidate of Jesse Winburn, and by others as being the candidate of Mr. Enders, by others as being the candidate of Mr. Greer, and others as being the candidate of Mr. Dill and Mr. Johnson.

I desire here to state that I am not the candidate of any of them. Unless I can be the candidate of the people, regardless of factions and individuals, then I miss my desire. The citizens of Ashland need to be brought together in harmonious work for the upbuilding of the town. It seems to me to be one of Ashland's paramount needs, and I shall strive for that end. I absolutely refuse to be the candidate of any individual or faction. If I am elected, one citizen shall have as much influence in guiding my administration as another, regardless as to what faction they may adhere. To successfully deliver the sort of administration I hope to give Ashland, I will need the support of all the people, and if elected, I shall certainly expect that and shall try to conduct the affairs of the city in such manner as to justify it.

It is said that my candidacy was launched at a Jesse Winburn banquet, and, therefore, I am a Jesse Winburn candidate, and will be directed in my administration by him. I think a fair explanation of how I came to become a candidate is due at this time.

The day that my name was first mentioned as a candidate for mayor, I had responded to a telephone invitation to attend a dinner at the Ashland hotel, given by Jesse Winburn for the purpose of getting some 50 citizens together to endorse and insist on the candidacy of Dr. R. L. Burdick for the office of mayor. I attended that dinner in good faith to urge Burdick's candidacy. Dr. Burdick was present and absolutely declined to allow his name to be used as a candidate, whereupon Mr. Greer, without my knowledge and without consulting me in regard to it, proposed my name as a candidate.

His suggestion was a great surprise to me, because, up to that time, I had not considered the matter at all. After his suggestion, a petition asking me to become a candidate was circulated, and I was informed that it had been signed by every person at the tables, in number about 50, of as fine citizens as Ashland possesses. A few days after that, the railroad boys, among whom I count many very dear friends, organized a Loomis-for-Mayor club, without any suggestion from me, and pledged their unqualified support to my candidacy. In the meantime, many friends and neighbors, from every walk of life and every part of the city, called on me and urged me to accept the candidacy. I considered the matter for some time before I decided to stand as a candidate. I tried to view it from all angles. I took into consideration my physical infirmity and my mental capacity. I love Ashland and feel that a more progressive administration of her affairs would redound to her great good. So, after considering the matter from every angle, I decided to accept the place with full confidence both in my mental and physical ability to fill it efficiently, if elected.

So, I stand today as a candidate of no man or set of men. I feel grateful for the hearty support I am getting from all of the above named gentlemen. I do not think any one of them has the desire to dictate to me, if I am elected. None of them have ever indicated any such desire. I am making the campaign without a pledge to any of them, nor shall I make any pledges to anybody, except to every citizen, that if you have confidence enough in me to elect me mayor, I shall appreciate the great honor and the good will indicated by your support and pledge myself to give the city my best attention and the best that is in me for a better, more economical and efficient government, with the prayer that the Great Architect of the destinies of nations and cities may give me the good judgment to administer the affairs of the city in a manner that will be a pride to citizens and of great good to the city we all love and want to see developed to greater proportions, and made even a better place in which to live and rear our families.
