Bids will be opened December 11 in Sacramento.

Many Deer Are Killed—

There were 469 deer killed in the Klamath national forest, in Siskiyou county, during the past season, according to Perry Hill, assistant forest supervisor. Rangers and fire lookouts aided in furnishing the figures. The number of deer killed this year exceeds the number last year by seven. As many deer were killed outside the national forest, it is estimated that 800 deer, or nearly five tons of venison, were killed in Siskiyou county alone during the season.
