"What did he say?" "He told the men to keep away from the mines and not worry about their jobs. They are no good anyway," he said, "let the bosses dig for themselves, or pay you what you ask for and make the mines decent to work in. Let them do the worrying and let them come to you and ask you to go to work, but don't go until the mine is safe and you get enough so you can live decently with no more rustling cards."

"Soon after that he was hung." "Do they know who hung Little?" "Of course they do! Everybody knows. It was the company's guard or — and believe me, they got mighty big money for it."

"But don't say anything. We are not supposed to know anything about it, and if the company finds it out we get fired. The mining companies and the railroad companies work together." (From Seattle Daily Call.)

put an end to freedom of the press in the American metropolis.

This evidently was not the original plan. The Washington bureaucracy, backed by the representatives of greedy and sinister special interests that have become so powerful in Washington since the war, anticipated that the postmaster general could go merrily ahead under the new law and stamp out, first the Socialist press here, then all other organs that showed a trace of liberal opinion.

Two things have stopped this. One was the tremendous popular response to the fight of The Call for a free press. Another factor was the growing strength of the Socialist campaign in this city and the indication of a tremendous sweep to Hillquit.

FEDERAL MEDIATOR IS TO COME

Clifton, Ariz., Oct. 29.—Secretary of Labor William B. Wilson announced tonight that Vernon C. Reed, of Denver, federal mediator representing the Department of Labor, left Clifton this morning for San Francisco to act in the threatened strike of telephone employes on the Pacific coast.

Mr. Reed is expected to arrive in San Francisco Tuesday night.

Secretary Wilson, who is here as chairman of the Federal Industrial Commission investigating labor conditions in the Arizona copper camps, said that Commissioner Reed would act for the commission in San Francisco until the other members arrive there. He said it would be impossible to say when he and the other commissioners would reach the Pacific coast. It is their present intention to go to Bisbee, Ariz., after they conclude their work here.

TELEPHONE GIRLS' MAY STRIKE

San Francisco, Oct. 30.—A coast wide strike of approximately 5000 organized electrical workers and telephone operators of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Company, scheduled for midnight October 31, appeared inevitable tonight.

Late today 40 unions of male electrical workers, by a referendum vote of approximately 14 to 1, rejected the company's counter proposition offering half of the wage increase demanded and certain other betterments. The vote also favored by the same ratio support to the telephone operators, whose demands for recognition were definitely refused by the company last Saturday. Federal mediation loomed up tonight as an immediate possibility and apparently as the only hope of averting the walk-out.

SITUATION IN RUSSIA

Statement issued by the Petrograd Staff

Petrograd, Oct. 29.—The officers of the Petrograd garrison met today to discuss the position of the Russian army and adopted a resolution declaring that any authority on the part of its chiefs is virtually non-existent. The resolution says in part:

"The community, as it is at present, can not defend Russia. On the contrary, the approach of winter and the present subversive aspirations of the army and its lack of any sense of responsibility will complete the ruin of the country, it is feared. We do not renounce our duty, but in answering for ourselves we do not answer for our men. The time has come to make this declaration openly so that nobody may trust in vain delusions."

General Kadlines, hetman of the Don Cossacks, has telegraphed to the war ministry that it is impossible to combat the increasing anarchy in the mining districts, owing to disorganization of the militia. He states that self-constituted organizations are usurping authority, and asks for funds with which to reorganize the militia.

NEW CABINET FOR ITALY IS FORMING

Rome, Oct. 29.—Minister of the Interior Orlando was believed to have completed the new Italian cabinet late this afternoon. Formal announcement was withheld.

The new cabinet is said to be composed of old members, excepting that the prime minister is changed.

U-BOAT CAPTURES AN AMERICAN SCHOONER

London, Oct. 29.—The Fanny Prescott, a three-masted American schooner, has been seized by a German submarine. It was announced by the admiralty today. The U-boat attacked the vessel and when the crew abandoned her the submarine took the vessel in tow.

The pudder, used by the street contractors for mixing the "black-stuff" for the pavements, caught fire this forenoon from being overheated, necessitating the calling of the fire department.

IN JUSTICE COURT.

In the civil suit in Justice Carney's court this morning in which Dr. Kelly sued R. Treusdale on a dental bill, the court found in favor of the plaintiff in the sum of twenty-five dollars, but stipulated that each side was to bear his own costs. As the costs were said to have amounted to more than the bill, the plaintiff gave notice of appeal, while the defendant departed smilingly.

TRIAL OF CUTTING AFFRAY.

The case of the State of Oregon vs. Pete Andrews in which the defendant is charged with assault with a dangerous weapon upon the person of Louis Callas, a Greek, is on trial today in the Circuit Court. Andrews and Callas were partners in the fishing business last fall, it seems, and in a quarrel arising out of their venture, Andrews is alleged to have slashed his partner on the leg with a knife. District Attorney Judd is appearing for the state and Attorney Norblad for the defendant.

NOT SLICK ENOUGH.

William Dolfin, former cook for Company C, Third Oregon Infantry, was arrested Saturday at Pendleton and returned to Portland charged with serious offenses against the government. It is presumed he intended to do all the harm he could on the information he was able to acquire, but was apparently unable to keep his mouth shut at the same time and now finds himself facing court martial.

NOT GUILTY.

In the case of the State of Oregon vs. Mark Minaker for non-support of a minor child heard yesterday before Judge Eakin in the circuit court, the defendant was found not guilty by the trial jury which was composed entirely of men. No doubt the verdict was in accordance with the testimony, but it hardly looks to be in accordance with equal suffrage to have a case of this kind dependent solely on the male or boss view point.

OLD PIONEER DIES.

C. J. Curtis, among the oldest residents of Astoria and a man who led the interesting and varied career of a Westerner, died yesterday morning at St. Mary's Hospital of acute asthma, aged 64 years. Mr. Curtis has, during his 35 year residence in Astoria, served in nearly every political and civil capacity of municipal life. He had friends and enemies, like any other human being, and lived out his life doing the best he could according to his light, which is as much as anyone does. He will be buried tomorrow, the fraternal orders of which he was a member having charge of the services.

OUR REPRESENTATIVE HERE.

Congressman Willis C. Hawley arrived in Astoria last evening from Portland, and it is reported, will spend the day conferring with local citizens regarding river and harbor improvements, the site for the proposed naval base, the deepening of the Young's Bay and Young's river channels, the proposed aviation base, and so forth. After all which, he will be tendered a luncheon at the Weinhard hotel and rush on to some other portion of his political district and jolly somebody else.

It is not expected that he will confer with representatives of the working class at all, although they have vastly more votes to confer. He, like every other capitalist politician, knows they have, and may continue to be, a flock of sheep following where some strange bell-wether leads them. When the workers begin to show the power of solidarity at the ballot box, if they ever do, Mr. Hawley, and others like him, will be only too glad to bid for their favor. Until then, they will get just what they deserve, a chance to stand out in the street while he eats with those who do show solidarity at the voting booth.
