to believe the masters rather than workers that they are not taking this description from a "wild agitator." Writes Dr. Krishna:

India is an immense country, numbering among its physical features the highest mountains and some of the largest rivers in the world. It has many varieties of climate, many wonderful forests, and the greatest variety of animals and beasts of any nation of its size. Its gold and diamond mines and pearl fisheries are of world-wide fame.

India's population is about 320,000,000. Her wealthiest merchant prince is worth something less than \$4,000,000, and there are about one hundred men who may be worth \$1,000,000. Some seven hundred Indians have a yearly income of from \$30,000 to \$40,000; 15,000 of from \$3,000 to \$7,000; about the same number of from \$600 to \$1,200. Sixty thousand Indians make from \$200 to \$500 a year; perhaps 150,000 from \$100 to \$200, and certainly not over 300,000 can boast of a yearly income of, say, from \$75 to \$100. This in spite of their country's rich resources.

India's school system is the poorest in the world. It has neither free schools nor night schools. There is not a single free school or college in the whole of India. Only the children of rich and of middle class families have schooling. The school fees are too high in proportion to the income of the people. Ninety-nine per cent of the children born in poor or in working class families have no chance whatsoever to enter a school. Only \$15,000,000 is allotted for education of 320,000,000 souls.

Shoes, clothing and medicines are the greatest luxuries to the workers of India. Ninety per cent of the poor sick die without medical help. More than half the population of India have nothing to cover their bodies, yet India is the second largest cotton producing country in the world. India exports yearly \$150,000,000 worth of raw cotton to all parts of the world. She exports food, chiefly rice and wheat, worth \$150,000,000 to \$175,000,000, yet

fully 25 per cent of her entire population have not even enough rice soup once a day. Tea worth \$60,000,000 is exported from India yearly, yet scarcely 6 per cent of the population can afford tea.

The Indian workers toil from 12 to 16 hours a day during 363 days a year. The highest paid Indian worker earns about 31 cents a day, the lowest paid as little as 5 cents a day. The average Indian worker earns from 8 to 10 cents a day.

Trade unions are forbidden by law. The workers have many societies, but none dares hold an open or public meeting. In a large number of places the workers have to keep one or two months' wages on deposit with their masters. On the tea, coffee and rubber plantations of India, and in other parts of Asia, the meanest and the most inhuman conditions exist. Torture, beating, whipping and in some cases, killing by the European masters are recognized as legal by the laws and courts of India.

When a little child, innocent and helpless, is born in a worker's family, it is poorly fed and still more poorly clothed. Boy or girl, there is no joy in store for that child. There will be no happy school life. The child will have to work at least twelve hours a day for a cent or two daily wages from the age of 7 or 8. There will be no joyous youth, no thrill of conscious manhood or womanhood. There will never be enough food; there will be no flowers, no fruits, no companions, and above all, no one to give the hand of friendship. Death will be the friend most welcome in that home.

Such, in short, is the life of the Hindu worker.

**THIRTEEN MORE CERTIFIED FOR THE ARMY**  
The Clatsop county exemption board received a telegram from the district board yesterday informing them that thirteen more men have been certified for military duty. They are:

The men have been notified to be ready for call to fill the gap caused by the rejection of 12 Clatsop county men.

**PREJUDICE IS LAW**  
Forty-eight hours have passed since we published the original letter of threat from the "Committee of Eleven." In that time not a single civil official has even called us upon the phone. Consequently, it is easy to see how much protection we may expect from those who took an oath to enforce the laws. August Nikula is an American citizen, and a good one—a law-abiding citizen. And even if he were not a citizen, does the government expect foreigners to defend it when its officers neglect to offer any defense to them? Have some people duties but no rights? Stop and think where

this dangerous philosophy may end. If a few wealthy masters in high powered automobiles may resort to mob law, what is there for the outraged poor to honor, who outnumber them a thousand to one?

What is District Attorney Judd doing? Has Prejudice, unreasoning prejudice, superceded reason and law here as in some other places? Have we nothing to hope from civil officials? Are we at the mercy of midnight murderers?

**A CRAFTY SCHEME**  
It is reported that the shipyard owners too are dissatisfied with the wages fixed by the government mediation board, miserably low as the scale is, and to be planning a ruse something like this:

The men of each craft are to be divided into four classes, number one class only being allowed the maximum wage fixed by the commission. The other three classes will have a graded scale of some sort, depending principally, no doubt, on the whims of the boss who will likely be guided by the men's subservency.

The scheme may even meet with some favor from craft-minded workmen themselves. It can hardly be put through if it does not. Anyway, the spectacle repeats itself, of corporations violating their own agreements before their signatures are cold. What are we to do about it? Well, once there was a man named Nicholas. 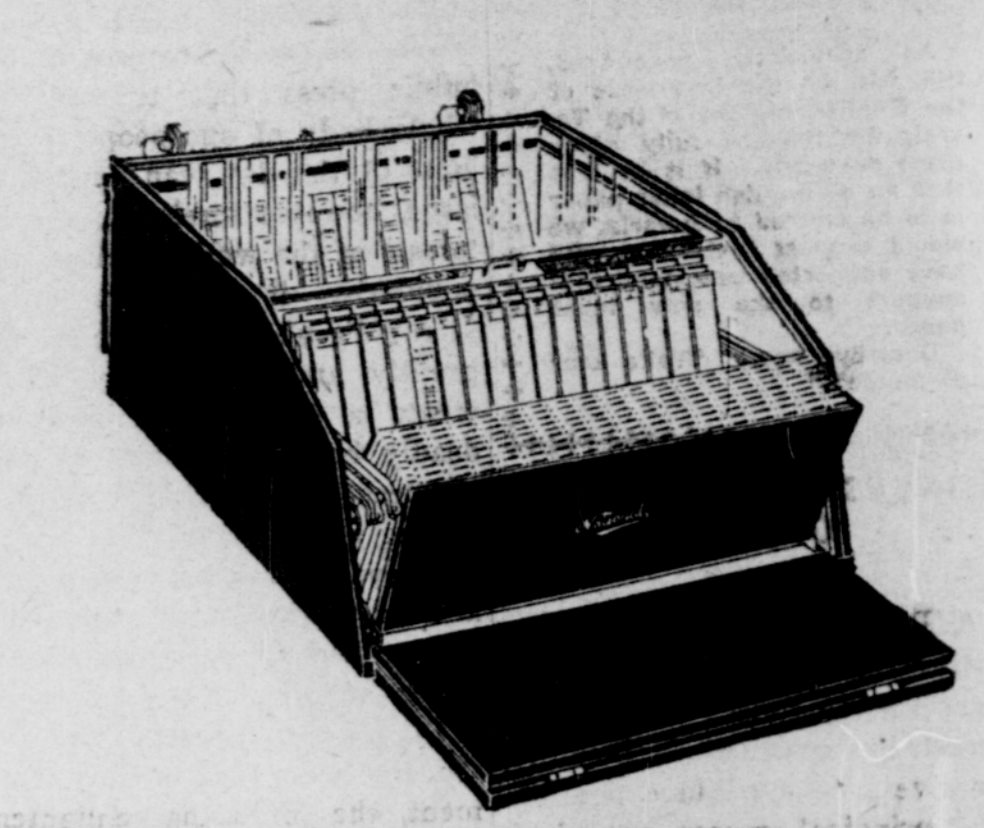
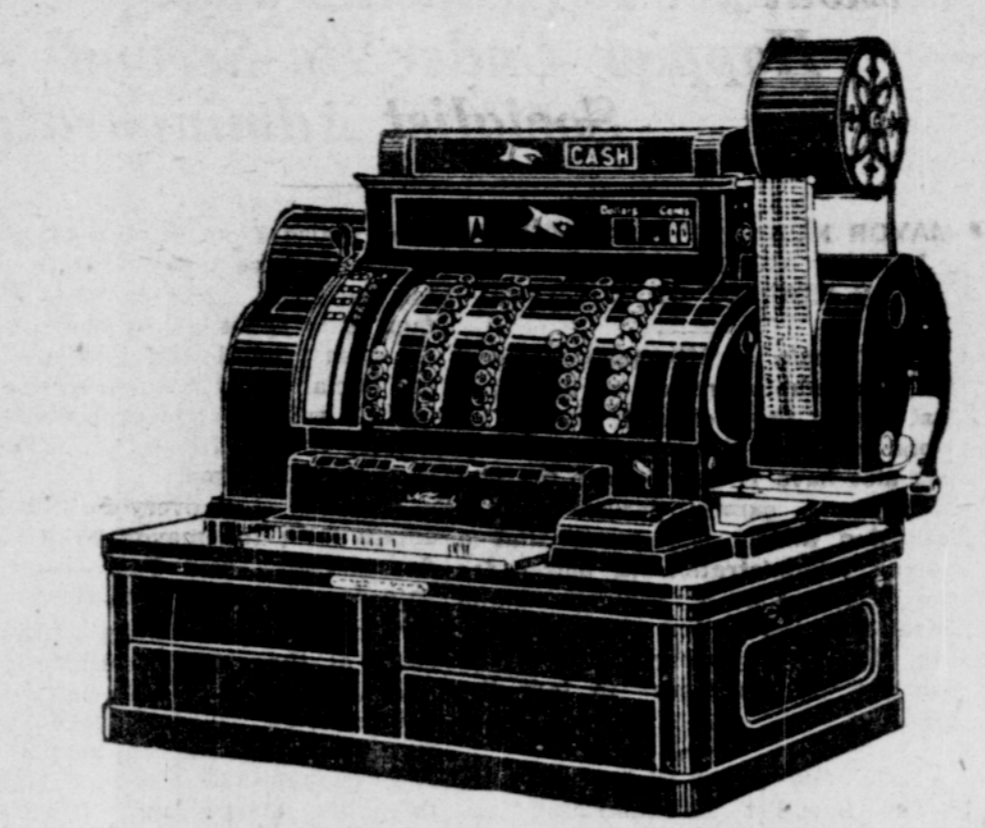
