Coe avenue, 70x25 feet, two stories high, to be used by Livingstone & Co. as a general merchandise store.

The O. R. & N. Co. will begin the erection of a new modern depot building at Stanfield as soon as the depot at Pendleton is completed.

Grounds have been set aside in the northwest part of town for the building of the O. R. & N. stock yards.

An alfalfa meal mill is being strongly talked of for Stanfield and will no doubt be erected in the near future.

J. E. Faucett has put in a small stock of merchandise in a tent, ample to supply the immediate needs of the people in the town during the building construction. The business is in charge of Mrs. Faucett.

Leaving the town of Stanfield we drove down onto the river bottom lands and out among the famous alfalfa fields of the Umatilla Meadows. This soil is very productive of alfalfa, but will not compare so favorably with the higher lands under the Furnish-Coe project in fruit culture and the growing of berries. Here, adjoining the townsite of Stanfield on the north, is located the Umatilla Ranch of 3,000 acres, famed far and wide for its productiveness in the growing of alfalfa and cereals. This ranch has been cut up into 80-acre tracts and placed on the market.

On the return drive home we passed by a number of well improved, thrifty, homelike and evident prosperous places, including the 80-acre place of Frank Saling; the home of C. B. Bock, of Minot, N. D., who has five acres of young Winesap apple trees that are all thrifty and starting a good growth. They were set out the first of April.

The potato fields of E. H. Brown and J. D. Wallace are in a high state of cultivation and will both produce good crops. Mr. Wallace came here with his family from Osceola, Iowa, and purchased twenty acres from the Columbia Land Company. He has built a nice home, improved his land and he and family are in a happy and prosperous condition.
