MANY BUSINESS AND LAND DEALS

FINE RESIDENCE PROPERTY IS SOLD—OPERA HOUSE COMPANY SHARES SOLD.

The past few days have been prolific in important land and business deals at and near Enterprise, and are considered by men in the heart of things a fair indication of the activity that will prevail all spring.

C. E. Vest sold for F. A. DePue the south end of his home property, 240x230 feet, to J. A. French, whose home adjoins it on the west. At the same time Mr. Vest himself bought of DePue the north end of the 5 acres containing the home and other buildings. This part is 330x160 in size and is one of the most desirable residence lots in town. Mr. Vest will make his home there after Mr. DePue and family leave for Eugene about May 1. The price paid was not made public but street rumor says it was close to \$4000 for the 5 acres.

Litch Buys Another Corner. Another transfer of residence property in the south part of town was made Saturday, when Sam Litch bought an unimproved tract of Wm. Zurcher, running from the river 270 feet south on River street to the George Emmons place, with a depth of 240 feet. An L street will be planned running from River street, just north of Emmons', to the east line, thence south to Residence street.

Opera House Shares Sold.

T. R. Akins, A. C. Miller and W. I. Calvin have bought the shares of S. L. Burnaugh and E. B. Wheat in the opera house company, and the three are now sole owners of the stock of that concern.

MUST PAY \$1000 MORE STATE TAX

REAPPORTIONMENT BY EQUALIZATION BOARD RAISES WALLOWA'S SHARE.

Under the new emergency tax law for the reapportionment of the state revenue among the various counties, Wallowa's share is raised \$1000, and this county will have to send \$10,327.50 to Salem.

As far as Wallowa is concerned we have no great kick coming. Union which was already paying over \$28,000 state tax is raised to \$29,707.50, or nearly three times that of this county. This probably is about a fair proportion.

The equalized assessment of this county is \$4,844,885, a decrease of \$2,382,000, in round numbers, from the county assessor's figures. Union's was raised from \$7,109,835 to \$13,536,521. Baker's county assessment was raised one-half by the state and Denton's doubled. Columbia's more than out in two, Harney's trebled and Hood River's doubled.

DEATH RECORD.

The entire community was saddened by the news of the death of Mrs. W. C. Eades of Alder Slope, Thursday. Her illness was so brief that few knew she had been sick. She was suffering from incipient pneumonia when she gave birth to a baby daughter Wednesday forenoon. The mother passed away at 1:15 o'clock Thursday morning.

Funeral services were held in the Methodist church in this city Friday at 11 a. m., the church being entirely filled with sympathizing friends from Alder Slope, this city and Lostine. Rev. C. E. Trueblood spoke words of comfort and hope to the bereaved family. Father Owen led in prayer and the choir sang, "Lead, Kindly Light," "Nearer, My God, to Thee," "Haven of Rest," and "Jesus, My Soul." A long cortege followed the remains to the cemetery.

Nellie B. Allen, daughter of W. H. and Anna Allen, was born in Bourbon county, Kan., Dec. 27, 1878, and died at her home near Enterprise, Thursday, Feb. 25, 1903, aged 30 years, two months and 27 days. She was married to William Chris Eades, Oct. 5, 1899, at the home of her parents near Lostine. She leaves to mourn her death, a husband, two sons and two daughters, the youngest the infant daughter born Wednesday; these and the father and mother, five brothers, three sisters and a host of friends sorrow deeply for her departure. This is the second death in the father's family within a year, a brother Virgil who died last March, being the first to break the family circle.

The deceased united with the M. E. church at Wallowa at an early age and has always lived an earnest christian life. In the home she was a dutiful daughter, a true wife and loving mother should be. Her faith was unwavering and in her last hours she repeated the Lord's Prayer.

Leola, infant daughter of W. C. and the late Nellie Eades, died March 2, aged 6 days. Funeral was held Wednesday afternoon, from the home.

LIGHT AND POWER COMPANY AT LAKE

DETAILS OF PROJECT MEANING MUCH TO UPPER VALLEY DEVELOPMENT.

A project that undoubtedly means much for the upper valley and probably for the entire south half of Wallowa county, is initiated by the filing in the county clerk's office of the articles of incorporation of the Wallowa Lake Light and Power company. The purpose of the company very broad and includes the appropriation of water for irrigation, power and light purposes. The incorporators are Jay H. Dobbins, of Prairie Creek, the great woolgrower, Aaron Wade of Alder Slope, and L. E. Caviness, land owners and capitalists. The other two members of the board of directors are L. Knapp, banker and landowner, who is president of the company, and A. Wurzelwein, real estate agent at Joseph, who is secretary. Mr. Wade is vice president.

Will Appoint Surveyor.

The March term of the county court will convene today, Wednesday. There is quite a large amount of road business to be considered, the usual batch of bills and claims to be audited, and a county surveyor to be appointed in place of R. L. Long, resigned. A petition asking the appointment of A. H. Rudd has found many signers. Mr. Rudd is at Golden, Col., at present, but still owns his home here and expects to return as soon as he finishes his business in Golden.

Ex-County Surveyor Merryman has many friends who would like to see him get the place. He has no petition out but is willing to assume the duties of the office if the court appoints him.

S. F. Poe, who cried the A. J. Poe sale near Lostine, Friday, reports good prices. The stock especially sold well. The sale totaled nearly \$3,500.

Apply for Bank Charter.
