Robert Wissler is now conductor of one of the branch trains in place of Frank Mytenger, who was transferred to the Pilot Rock run.

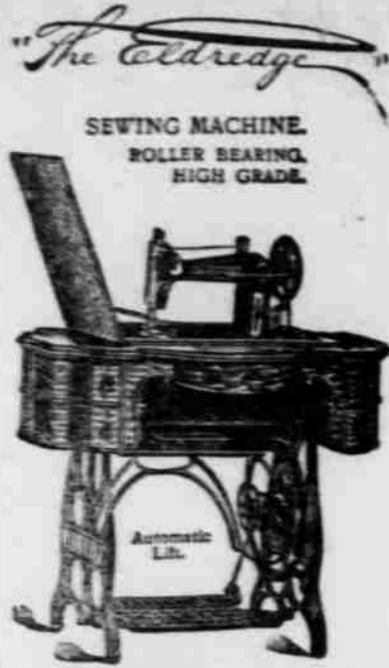
Charles Wilkins of Bedford, Iowa, arrived here last week and has accepted a position as lineman with the Home Independent telephone company.

RESTORATION TO ENTRY OF LANDS IN NATIONAL FOREST.

Notice is hereby given that the lands described below, embracing 125 acres, within the Wallowa National Forest, Oregon, will be subject to settlement and entry under the provisions of the homestead laws of the United States, and the act of June 11, 1896 (34 Stat., 227), at the United States land office at La Grande, Oregon, on July 21, 1909.
