She leaves to mourn her demise her husband, three sons, Elmer, Clyde and Edwin; six daughters, Mrs. Geo. Morrow and the Misses Cora, Maude, Cressie and Edna, all of Anatonie besides two brothers, L. A. and Wm. Ellis; also two sisters, Mrs. W. V. Bowersock, and Mrs. A. C. McDonald of Vancouver, Wash., all being here except Mrs. McDonald and Mrs. Pyle.
