Finally each member of the company proceeded in turn to quote the most striking and appropriate tombstone inscription he could remember. When it came Mr. Morgan's turn he declared that the most pathetic and expressive thing of the kind that had ever been brought to his attention was the following tribute of a disconsolate husband to his wife, who lies buried in the neglected little cemetery of a Maine village:

"She was good and true, and she was the best plemaker in Somerset county."
