Mr. and Mrs. Eckley Davis were with him for a week or 10 days before he died, and Mr. Graves, Miss Alta and Ira La is went out to the funeral which was held from the First Baptist church, Saturday forenoon at 10 o'clock. Burial was in Baker City cemetery.

The deceased was a young man of fine character and very highly thought of. His many friends here sympathize deeply with the widow, children and other relatives.
