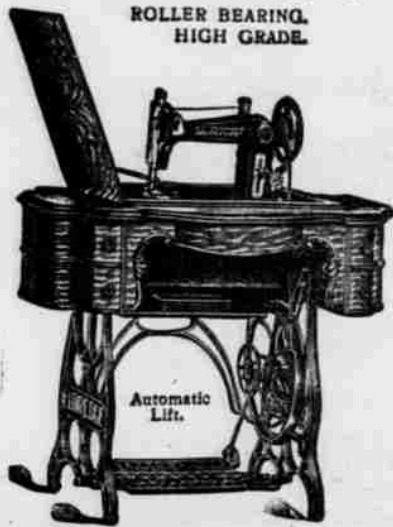

CLARKSTON MEN PRAISE HILL LAND

HEAVY INVESTORS SATISFIED
WITH PURCHASES—RAILROAD
DOWN GRANDE RONDE?

C. Murdock of Clarkston, who
bought the J. W. Emmons ranch of
over 1900 acres on Day Ridge a few
months ago, was in town the first of
last week in company with Mr. Em-
mons, completing final details of the
deal.

Mr. Murdock is a man of varied ex-
perience in several states, Iowa, Min-
nesota, Washington and Idaho, and
has been a money-maker in all of
them. He was concerned in land
deals, both farm property and town
sites in the East, and has owned and
sold considerable real estate in
Asotin county. He was for a year
or two, publisher of the Clarkston
Republic, and he got out a bright and
newsy paper while he held down the
editorial chair.

Mr. Murdock is mighty well pleas-
ed with his big investment in land in
this county and predicts a great future
for farming in the hills. He also has
faith that the North country will be
served with a railroad in a compara-
tively short time. In addition to the
published intentions of the North
Coast, backed by the final location
survey work there is unmistakable
evidence that there is something doing
up the Grande Ronde. Timber
cruisers have been cruising all the
timber on both sides of the river to
way below Troy. While no great
body of timber has yet been purchas-
ed, and the identity of the employer
of the cruisers is unknown, there
have been many straws pointing to
the largest manufacturer of lumber
in this section of the state. This
and other reasons are back of the
persistent rumors that the O. R. &
N. will be extended at least as a
logging spur, from Roadway to Troy
or below.

Mr. Murdock has backed up this faith
by other purchases up north until
he now owns over 2000 acres on Day
Ridge and a quarter section near
Bartlett. His son is managing the
big ranch on Day Ridge and his family
have resided there this summer.

W. E. Howard Here.

W. E. Howard, of Clarkston, who
has made heavy investments in hill
land north of this city, was here
last week looking after his property.
Mr. Howard is well satisfied with
his land which includes the major
portion of Ant flat, and confidently

looks forward to the day when all the
arable hill land here will be held at
as high prices as the Asotin county
wheat land.

County Court To Convene At Troy

Will Hold Meeting To Consider
Project of Bridge Across
Grande Ronde.

The county court will hold a meet-
ing at Troy, Saturday, October 9, at
10 a. m., and all residents of that
vicinity or others interested in the
building of a bridge across the Grande
Ronde river at or near Troy, are
invited to be present.

This general invitation of the court
ought to result in the biggest gather-
ing ever in the North country, if the
people came out in proportion to
the need for a bridge.

The Grouse, Troy and Eden coun-
ty is among the most fertile in the
Inland Empire, and while there are
many fine ranches there now, if it
had transportation facilities it would
become in a few years the most thick-
ly settled part of the county. But
even with a bridge the change will
be marked, for at present the set-
tlers depend for all communication
with the rest of the county upon a
ferry that proved so uncertain last
winter that the people received only
three mails in a month.

The bridge is not only a public
necessity, but would be a good in-
vestment as it is admitted that the
increase in assessed valuation would
pay the county for its expenditure
in a few years.

fering with the court.
