Saturday was the last day for candidates to file for the coming primaries. The complete list of candidates shows 83 republican candidates and 20 democratic candidates. There are six candidates for governor alone, of which four are republicans, and seven candidates for congress.

Five hundred Chinese pheasants will be imported into Louisiana by the game commission and distributed in sections where these birds can thrive and propagate their kind. Mr. F. M. Miller, chief warden of the commission, has placed an order for this number of birds with a fancier at Corvallis, Ore.

The pioneers of Southern Oregon, when they meet in the historic old town of Jacksonville this fall for their annual reunion, will discuss plans for the erection of a log cabin to contain the relics of early pioneer days. The log cabin will be typical of early life in Oregon, with spinning wheel, rawhide-bottomed chairs and coonskin tacked to the door.

Briefs in answer to the demurrer of the Oregon & California Railroad company to the federal suit begun September 4, 1909, to compel the company to sell to settlers land conveyed to the corporation by the terms of the congressional land grant of 1886 have been filed in the United States circuit court at Portland, thus protecting the rights of 3000 interveners in the suit.

Eugene is planning a big apple show during the latter part of October or the first of November. It is planned to place several boxes of expertly packed apples in each show window of all the stores on the principal business thoroughfare of the city, and display them in an attractive manner. Suitable prizes will be given to growers who have the best exhibits. This show will be held just previous to the big apple fair in Portland and the best of the local exhibits will be taken to that city to compete for prizes there.

Notice has been sent to all the railroad corporations in Oregon aside from the lines that make up the Harriman system, to the effect that all figures, estimates and other evidence for determining the physical valuation of the roads in this state must be in the hands of the commission by September 15. The valuations of the Harriman lines, that is, the Southern Pacific, Oregon Railway & Navigation Company and branch lines, has been completed. Only the smaller roads have not yet been completed and they had been given all summer to prepare their estimates.
