SPECIAL REPORT ON WALLOWA SCHOOLS

SUPERINTENDENT CONLEY REPORTS PROGRESS AND CONDITIONS TO STATE SUPT.

Following is the text of the special report on the schools of Wallowa county made by County Superintendent West Conley at the request of State Superintendent J. H. Ackerman, to be embodied in the biennial report of Mr. Ackerman.

In reply to your request I beg to submit the following special report of school conditions in this county:

General Outlook.
The general outlook for bettering school conditions in this county is more favorable than ever before. The patrons are demanding better qualified teachers and longer terms of school and are offering better salaries.

The rural schools are paying from \$7. to \$12. and get a number of the girls are planning to have eight or nine nine-month school this year.

Special Taxes.
A few years ago only the town schools provided any extra funds or the support of their schools, but now year 25 districts levied a special tax of from 1 to 15 mills.

Number of Districts.
In 1908 there were 42 districts in this county, while now (1910) we have 74, an increase of nearly 75 per cent. in 16 years.

Supervision.
With no office help, the clerical work more than doubled within 16 years, and the schools scattered over an area of about 4500 square miles, a great part of it rough and undrained, the work of supervision is very difficult.

I believe the superintendent's work is, and should be, largely supervisory and mostly confined to the rural schools, where as a rule, the inexperienced teachers are working. The town schools are in charge of capable and efficient principals and need very little of the superintendent's time.

Compulsory Education.
The compulsory law is 50% effective, but I believe it could be made more so by having the sheriff make county transfer officer. In almost every case a simple notice from him is sufficient to insure attendance and prevent further truancy.

New School Houses.
Several new schoolhouses are being built and additions made to others, the most notable of which are: Joseph, District No. 6, \$20,000 building; Wallowa, District No. 12, \$15,000, each being bonded for the respective amounts; Enterprise, District No. 11, is building a two-room addition to her already spacious building, and a number of the rural districts are planning to build, are putting in new furniture to meet the ever increasing demand, and believe the best is none too good for the boys and girls of Wallowa county.

High Schools.
We have a splendid County High school located at Enterprise, with an efficient corps of teachers doing excellent work.

Joseph, Lodi and Wallowa each have their district high schools, and are maintaining a full four years' course, and with their splendid buildings and equipments are able to meet the demands of their students.

Teachers.
I wish to commend the teachers of the county for the splendid efforts they are putting forth and the

interest they are manifesting in their work and their loyal support.

Teachers' Meetings.
We held three local institutes last year and found them very helpful and instructive. The last one of the year was held at Flora, and I wish to commend the people of that community for their enthusiastic welcome and hearty good will.

Annual Institutes.
The annual institute was held at Lostine with Prof. E. D. Restler and Supt. J. H. Ackerman as instructors and was the best ever held in the county.

LAFFERTY GIVEN CORDIAL GREETING

CANDIDATE FOR CONGRESS MAKES FRIENDS BY HIS PROGRESSIVE IDEAS.

A. W. Lafferty of Portland, progressive republican candidate for congressional nomination, made a court room full of friends by his address here Saturday night, and Wallowa men report an equally successful meeting at that city in the afternoon.

Mr. Lafferty is a young man, rising and full of vigor, who has done of his own and isn't afraid to tell them. He made what is termed around town, the best political speech heard here in years.

Mr. Lafferty bristles with indignancy. He is in favor of a federal income and inheritance tax, of tariff reduction on articles the American manufacturer of which is in the hands of a monopoly, like the wool trust. He stands for the Oregon primary law, popular election of United States senators, and is opposed to convention nominations.

Ellis Askep.
He told in graphic terms how Congressman Ellis went asleep while he was on the committee of which he is a member backed on a repeating clause to the reclamation bond bill by which Oregon lost over \$1,000,000 of reclamation funds that was the right of this state. Then because of pique or dislike of Oregon's senators, Ellis never gave them any warning and the grab was retroceded through the senate.

"That money should have been paid on irrigation projects in Oregon," said Mr. Lafferty, "some of it is here in Wallowa county in pouring water on the hill land."

State Care of Forests.
It was in his conservation policy that Mr. Lafferty especially struck a popular chord.

First he is in favor of restoring to homestead entry all agricultural lands now within the boundaries of the forest reserve.

Next, he would have the forests placed in trust in care of the state, under strict provisions that would insure careful trusteeship. The state men to patrol the forests, and the proceeds of all sales of ripe timber and grazing fees to go into the state treasury, where it belongs.
