News Record Pledge.

During the last few weeks many new subscribers have been added to the News Record list. To them, and to old friends as well, it desires to pledge the endeavor to print a county paper in the truest and largest sense of the term. The first consideration always with the News Record is the news—all the news of Wallowa county—and to present this news in a fair, impartial manner. The News Record is not a party, church, class or section organ, but a newspaper for the whole people. Every inquest will have a square deal in the news columns, even when the paper may oppose editorially the aims and purposes of that interest. What is meant by square deal in the news columns, is that anything and everything that is news, not opinions or views, will be printed and presented in the paper in as fair manner as the news of something the editor may happen to favor.

Editorially the News Record will continue to advocate what it believes to be just and right, having in mind the interests of the people on every occasion. This, mind you, is not saying we will always stand for what you think is right. We may sometimes even differ from a large majority of our readers for we claim the privilege of being wrong as many times and making just as many mistakes as any one of you.

The splendid support given the paper during the last three months is appreciated, and in return it will be our endeavor to publish a paper that will make both new and old subscribers firm friends of the News Record, and do everything in our power for the upbuilding of Wallowa county.

The total levy for county, road, state and school purposes fixed by the county court is eleven and one-half mills, probably the lowest levy in the whole state of Oregon. The Union county levy is 27 1-2 mills on a valuation variously estimated from 50 to 65 per cent of full value. It pays to be out of debt when tight times comes.
