## Pendleton Paper Is Sore.

The Pendleton East Oregonian showed a contemptible spirit in endeavoring to find excuses for its high school debating team's defeat at Enterprise by casting aspersions on the judges, whom, it says, came from "the recesses of Wallowa county," and were in favor of government ownership. Both statements are falsehoods and the East Oregonian knew, or ought to have known, the former was untrue, when it printed it.

All three judges are residents of Union county; none is a believer in government ownership; and the one vote for Pendleton was given by a gentleman who is a candidate for office and is seeking the suffrages of Wallowa county voters. Those facts speak eloquently of the impartiality of the judges, as well as of the decided superiority of the Wallowa County debaters. The truth is, the local team made and clinched two points to one by the Pendleton team.

The Pendleton team and Prof. Landers showed a sportsmanship and courage in defeat that should shame their home paper. They were gentlemen who fought manfully on the weak side of the question, and acknowledged they were fairly and squarely beaten.

The East Oregonian is as childish and contemptible as was the Eugene audience when its team was beaten by Lebanon.

With its big debt and heavy tax burden, Union county has a dark outlook says the La Grande Star, and it adds that it is no wonder real estate firms are going out of business there. The contrast is bright here. The real estate men are making sales because a county out of debt and with a low tax levy is a mighty attractive proposition to settlers. With the best high school in Eastern Oregon, all paid for, and liberal appropriations for good roads, the combination is a great booster. But the present county court will not get the praise it deserves until misrepresentation of its work ceases to serve selfish aims.

The Elgin Recorder said last week: "Numerous editorials appearing in some of the Wallowa county papers regarding their county affairs are disgusting in the extreme. Never a week passes but what a fat, juicy lemon is handed the county court, and still the county is out of debt and the people have only a 1 1/2 mill tax to pay this year."

A former Enterprise man now a resident of a boom town in California writes: "Send me a drink of good water and something to keep off the mosquitoes." A sample of our winter weather would add the finishing touch to that man's regret in leaving good old Wallowa.

In an address at Portland last week, Francis J. Heney, the "terror to evil-doers," said the railroads had become stronger than the government. Control and regulation have failed. The only remedy left is government ownership.

Sales of both city and country real estate the last week presage activity in that line this season. Property listed at reasonable figures will find ready sales for this will be the banner year in Wallowa county.

### As Viewed By Uncle Silas.

Editor News Record: Mr. Jonas, in his paper, The Wallowa Sun, asks, "And now, Mr. Voter, which would you rather pay, a tax of 20 mills on a 1/2 valuation, or a tax of 1 1/2 mills on a on a full valuation?"

I would sooner pay the former. To make this year's tax as low as it ought to be, and to even up with the times when county warrants sold for 75 cents on the dollar, it ought to be 1/2 of 20, or 6 1/2 mills. This is the way I cypher it out: 3 mills for common school, 2 mills for the state, and 1 1/2 mills to pay the county officers. This I guess we have got to levy according to the state law. We don't need anything for roads, bridges, courts, elections, or current expenses of the county. We don't need anything for the high school. I am agin this higher education as they call it. Barin' knowin' how to cypher a little I never had any higher education, and I have always got along middlin' well. Either let the county go in debt or saddle everything onto the railroad

when it comes in. Shuv the debt onto the next generation. The county can borrow money at 6 per cent and we have to pay 10. Of course if we ever pay out of debt we will have to pay out with 10 per cent money. But that is neither here nor there.

I have been readin' the Sun, and to my notion Mr. Jonas knows about how the county ought to be run. He is an old pioneer of the county, havin' lived amongst us nigh onto two or three years. He is also a taxpayer of the county. For my part I would like to see him and Mr. Stahl, and Mr. Stahl members of the board of county commissioners. Let them run on the platform: "No taxes, no schools, and agin the present rasheem," and they can git the votes of me and all my boys.
